ANSELL, William, cm chm up auc apsr undertaker, Market Place, Fakenham (1794–1849d).

Started his shop in Fakenham Market Place in 1794 and advertised for an apprentice ("A Premium will be expected") (NM 1/11/1794). Took app Richard Bird, 15/12/1794, £20 (6 yrs); James Digings, 16/1/1797, £10 (6 yrs).

Extended his cabinet and chair-making business to auctioneering & appraising in 1798 (NC 15/9/1798). Auctioned part of his stock-in-trade in 1799, presumably due to financial pressures (NC 7/12/1799). Organised the funeral of Lord Andover at Holkham in January 1800. (Lord Andover was the son-in-law of Thomas William Coke. He died from gunshot wounds inflicted by his manservant in a shooting accident, aged 24). Holkham Hall accounts. 18/2/1800: Funeral. Wm Ansell of Fakenham, Coffin &c. for Lord Andover, as per estimate £75–10–0.

NC 24/10/1801: ...has fitted up a commodious Ware-Room, in his work yard...

NC 2/1/1802. Ad for "two good hands" & an apprentice.

1803 Subscribed to Sheraton's Cabinet Dictionary.

NC 16/6/1804: Selling off, The entire Unwrought Stock of Wm. Ansell...capital mahogany, in plank, board and veneer...combine selling by Private Contract till the latter part of September 1804, when the remaining stock will be Sold by Auction, W.A. declining the Manufacturing in the Cabinet Line at Michaelmas next.

Within 6 months of completing his 7-year apprenticeship he became involved in a dispute with James Roofe, an Aylsham carpenter, joiner and cabinet-maker, who was employed by Barfoot to fit out his shop. Barfoot was dissatisfied with the work and refused to pay one of Roofe's bills. Roofe then inserted a notice in the Norwich Mercury (19/7/1794) stating that Barfoot had endeavoured to injure my Character by informing many of my Customers that I had (using his own expressions) scandalously imposed upon him - a Bill for Work done on his premises;- This is to certify that the above Work has been surveyed by a Gentleman Surveyor from Norwich, of Mr. Barfoot's own choosing, and the Balance is in my favour 7s 41/2 d. N.B. I am under the disagreeable necessity of inserting the above to clear my Character, which Mr. Barfoot has so industriously endeavoured to destroy

The following week (NM 26/7/1794) Barfoot counter-attacked with a notice stating that Roofe has offered a gross imposition to the public, by affecting that he had a balance of 7s 4 1/2d coming to him after the work was surveyed...finding my reputation injured by the

above assertion, I find myself under the necessity of publicly contradicting the same, by asserting, that the balance is still in my favor considerably and to which my surveyor is witness; and the work executed with so much neatness and dispatch that I am fearful that one of the shop Windows will very soon fall into the Street if not timely prevented; the Counter, after standing 2 months was in so shattered a condition (and green oak being very cheap) that he readily acknowledged it to be a scandalous piece of Workmanship...

On 5/1/1795 Barfoot took an apprentice, John Turrell, with a premium of £30. However within a year he had given up trade and put the stock-intrade, household furniture and linen up for auction, together with the 12 years unexpired lease on the premises, "upon which near 100L has lately been expended in improvements, the situation is truly eligible, there being now no other of the Trade in or near that respectable neighbourhood."(NC 26/12/1795). The stock included over 1000 feet of:

good seasoned Mahogany in plank and board, some good veneers, beech and elm in trees, plank and board...mahogany and elm chairs, with horse hair and wood curved seats, plain and figured satin horse hair seating, handsome mahogany carved and inlaid bed posts, a great variety of handsome chintz, cotton, dimity, morine, cheney, cheque, and other bed-furniture...

This is one of the few contemporary advertisements to mention the hollow wooden chair-seats characteristic of East Anglia.

The reason for the early termination of Barfoot's career is unknown. In a later advertisement for the sale of the lease on the property it is stated that "business in a very extensive line has lately been carried on there, by the former Occupier..." (NC 16/4/1796), and there are no notices to indicate that he was bankrupt or insolvent.

The apprentice, John Turrell, was reassigned to Richard Kemp, cm of Yarmouth on 1/8/1796.

A rather mysterious figure. There is no evidence that he was admitted to the freedom of either Yarmouth or Norwich. He was apprenticed to Job Johnson of Yarmouth on 9/10/1820 for 7 years, but when he applied for his freedom ten years later, he was rejected, "Master admitting that Appr. did not serve nine mths of his time". He appeared in only one Norwich Directory, that for 1830, and in the same year advertised his stock and premises for sale. The NM for 6/3/1830 announces a 2-day auction of his household furniture and effects, new cabinet furniture and unwrought stock. The household furniture includes a "mahogany Grecian scroll couch on receded feet, eight castors, squab and two pillows stuffed with hair". The stock includes a "handsome bedstead with turned and fluted mahogany posts, drab moreen hangings finished with drapery, mahogany cornice, &c.", a mahogany "wardrobe bedstead", two sets of six and two elbow mahogany chairs with "hair seats and brass wires", sets of painted chairs with cane and rush seats and a "handsomely painted table on pillar and balls".

The unwrought stock:

comprizes an extensive assortment of Spanish and Honduras mahogany board and plank of various dimensions, African and curl veneers, upwards of 60 cedar boards, 1 inch to 1/4 inch and 10 inches to 30 inches wide, wainscot boards and planks, deal boards, teak wood, mahogany beds and flaps for dining tables, bed bottoms, pipe staves, a variety of brass furniture, screws, nails, &c. also three work benches complete, barrow on springs, grind-stone &c...The above Houses and Shops, occupied by Mr Beckett, with convenient Workshop, &c. at the back, will be Sold or Let together or separately.

The following month (NM 3/4/1830) he readvertised the property, with the substantial brick built Messuage or Dwelling House next door, lately occupied by Mr Rizen Mollett, a stove and grate manufacturer. Beckett's establishment comprised:

a large kitchen under the ground-floor; on the ground-floor a good shop; on the first floor a large sitting-room and a small one adjoining; and on the second floor two good bed-rooms, and attic over them. Also a capital large new brickbuilt Carpenter's or Cabinet-maker's Work-shop, with a saw-pit therein lately occupied by Mr. Beckett...adjoining the churchyard.

The advertisement is illustrated by a realistic engraving of the properties. They were rebuilt as Nos. 10 & 11 Tombland in 1976, closely reproducing the original elevation.

Standing-Beds, Chair-Beds, Picture-Beds, Table-Beds, and Feather-Beds; Bedsteads, and Sacking Bottoms for Beds; Quilts, Blankets, Ruggs, and Coverletts; Chairs, Tea-Tables, Dutch Tables, Pier-Glasses, Sconces, and all other Sorts of Glasses; Chests of Drawers, Writing-Desks, Corner-Cupboards and a very fine Cabinet; All Sorts of Silks, Callamancoes; Note, the House to be Lett, which is very convenient for either Gentleman or Draper. NG 3/5/1729: Thomas Bedford, of Stradbrooke in the County of Suffolk, Draper and Upholster, having a Design to leave off the Drapery Business...House and Shop will be Lett...designs to continue the Upholstery Business.

NG 12/3/1737ns: Whereas it has been reported that Mr. Thomas Bedford of Stradbrooke in the County of Suffolk has left off the Upholstry and Burial Business, this is to satisfie the Publick that it is false...He is also a sworne Appraiser, sells and buys all manner of houshold goods.

All Persons indebted...pay...to Mrs. Bell, the Executrix; Mr. Charles Chapman, Upholsterer; or to Mr. James Smyth, Attorney at Law, in Norwich.

NC 12/6/1773: ...at the House of Mr. Benjamin Bell, Cabinet and Chair-Maker...Consisting of Mahogany, Walnut-tree and Wainscot Bureaux, Mahogany cabinet with Glass Doors...Mahogany Chairs, Horse Hair Seats...square Mahogany Dining and Tea Tables, Bason Stands, Tea Chest and Trays, Tristrams' and many other Articles...In this Auction are Goods well made by the above Benjamin Bell...

An earnest and anxious appeal is now made to the Benevolent, to lend the helping hand towards assisting the widow in any way, by carrying on the Business of her late Husband of providing for and rearing her Infant Family...[List of donors].

NM 26/6/1819: Mrs. E. Best, Upholster, Cabinet

and Chair Maker, Imprest with gratitude... support...engaged an able Assistant from London, to manage her concern...her brother [ie brother-in-law], Mr. C. Best, No. 60, Berney Street [ie Berners Street], London, still continues his aid with new designs...

BEST, Jonathan, cm, King's Lynn (1782-1806).

Took app John Curle, shared with John Greeves, 20/12/1796, 40 gns.

BEST, Samuel, up cm chm ph, Market Place, St Stephen, Norwich (1815–1819d).

Samuel Best had a brief and traumatic career in Norwich. He advertised in the NM of 21/1/1815 that the partnership between himself and B.P. Titter was dissolved, although Titter never mentioned this partnership in his advertisements and was, in fact, in partnership with Richard & Joseph Bexfield at the time. If the partnership did exist its dissolution may have been precipitated by the dispute between Titter and the Norwich journeymen (see B.P. Titter). Best went on to state that he had taken premises in the Norwich Market Place, where he "intends manufacturing every article in the cabinet, upholstery, and chair branches" and that he had had "practical experience in some of the first houses in London". Two years later, however, Best was bankrupt. A notice in the NM of 15/2/1817 advertised a 4-day auction of his stock in trade and household furniture under a Commission of Bankruptcy. Two years after that he was dead, leaving a widow and three small children (see Elizabeth Best, above).

Curiously, Best is listed in Pigot's 1822 Directory, although by then he had been dead for 3 years.

In the NC for 24/2/1831 he invites the public to inspect "a set of tables made of Norfolk Variegate Oak, which he has had the honour to design and execute for His Royal Highness the Duke of Sussex, and which will remain at his Warerooms for a few days previous to their being removed to Kensington Palace." One wonders how this commission came about, and what was the nature of Norfolk variegate oak. In this and a subsequent advertisement (NM 5/7/1834) Bexfield stresses that the furniture is made "under his own immediate direction."

Joseph, like Richard, was needled by the advertisements of Joseph Gray, and responded with a notice in the NC of 21/5/1831, stressing the fact that the business has been established more than 20 years, and the "J.B. will not descend to adopt the fallacious mode of stating prices, which if he were disposed to do, the system of puffing is now too well understood to answer the purpose, and everyone knows that Price must ever be regulated by Quality."

In a NM advertisement of 5/7/1834 he lists his stock of "sideboards, dining tables, loo, card, Pembroke, and other tables, couches, chairs, cheffioneers, wardrobes, glasses, &c., and a general assortment of Upholdery Goods."

The business closed in 1838. A NM advertisement of 25/8/1838 offered the

Premises, situate in Pottergate Street, next the Friends Meeting House, now in the occupation of Mr. Joseph Bexfield (who declines the Cabinet Business,) consisting of shop, extensive warehouses, wood-yard, saw-pit, workshops and drying lofts attached. The Stock in Trade, Utensils, &c. may be taken at a valuation if desired...

The unwrought stock had evidently not been sold by Michaelmas as the following, final, advertisement appeared in the NM of 20/10/1838:

To Cabinet & Chair Makers, Joiners, Coach makers and others. Superior and well-seasoned stock of wood and veneers...auction...[2 days] The entire valuable unmanufactured stock of Mr. Joseph Bexfield, Pottergate Street, Norwich (who is retiring from business) comprehending 10,000 feet of Superior Spanish, Honduras and African Mahogany, in Planks, Boards and Veneers, and a variety of other Woods, all dry, fit for immediate use and of remarkably fine quality; Cabinet and Chair Makers' Benches, Vices, Cramps, and numerous other articles requisite in the trade.

In the NM of 28/4/1810 B.P. Titter announced that he had taken into partnership Messrs. Richard and Joseph Bexfield, "men of extensive experience in trade, and who have for some time acted as Superintendants in the manufacturing part of his Business." After 10 years Titter left the partnership and Richard & Joseph continued the business at 32 Pottergate Street (NM 6/5/1820),

adding that their ware-rooms were constantly supplied with furniture of their own manufacture, "which will be found to unite usefulness with classic taste, which enables them to Furnish Houses complete, either in the plainest or the most superb style, at a short notice and on terms more reasonable than any of the respectable London Houses." The same advertisement lists their stock, including upholstery materials, blinds, carpets and well-seasoned feathers. They offer designs for furniture and they furnish funerals.

Other newspaper advertisements followed (NM 14/7/1821 & 16/2/1822. NC 30/4/1825). In response to the advertisements of Joseph Gray, who offered savings of 40%, they advertised that they feel it a duty they owe to themselves and the public to state, that they do not hold out the flattering delusion that they are able to sell goods 40 per cent lower than other persons but that from their long experience in trade they are consequently acquainted with the best Markets and their buying their goods for ready money, they defy any person to sell goods of equal quality at lower prices than themselves" (NM 16/2/1822).

Two turning lathes are offered for sale in the same advertisement, which may imply that less of their stock was manufactured on the premises, but this is countered by comments in Joseph Bexfield's advertisements.

In the NM of 3 1/3/1827 they announced that they had "removed four doors further up Pottergate Street, to No. 103," indicating rather eccentric numbering. Richard Bexfield, by now aged at least 70, drops out of the advertisements from this point, appearing in poll books at Heigham, outside the old city walls, until 1835.

For the continuation of the Pottergate Street business, see Joseph Bexfield (1).

"He not only was a great frame maker and restorer of old pictures, but was the great expert on all artists of the Norwich School, having many of the now famous and valuable pictures by Crome, Cotman etc., through his hands. William Boswell died in 1877." 8 Following his death enterprise was taken over by his sons, Samuel Howard and James Charles, followed by his grandson, Bernard, who moved to Ethelbert House, Tombland in 1930, where the business survived into the 1950s. It was always called "William Boswell & Son" or "W. Boswell &

He fulfilled an unusual role between 1803 and 1811 as hirer of beds to the Hall during the sheep-shearings, the annual agricultural shows organised by Thomas William Coke. For example an account from July 1804 includes "The lend of 11 beds for use of sheep-shearing – £11–11–0. Use of looking glasses etc. £1–3–6." He is always referred to as an upholsterer in the Holkham account books, and indeed most of the accounts are for bedding and "sundry upholstery", both for the Hall and for houses on the estate. His final account was for £4–18–4 for wainscot, paid on 17/12/1837, presumably for the use of the estate carpenter. By this time he would be in his 80s: hence the suggestion that there may have been two generations called Thomas Bouch.

Two months after his wife's elopement Bream advertised the sale of his stock in trade, wrought and unwrought, "to be sold by Hand, either together or separate" (NM 26/9/1759). He also offered the lease on the premises, which had 3'/4 years to run. There was then a 13-year gap in his advertisements, but he continued to take apprentices during this period, so presumably he never actually sold his business.

After the 13-year silence he advertised in the NM of 29/8/1772 that he was at the Sign of the Tea-Chest, Blind Middle Street: "In consideration of the reduced Price of Mahogany, and in Ready Money...good Mahogany Chairs of a plain but neat Pattern (the seats covered with Horse-Hair) at 11s. 6d. each."

On 23/4/1774 he advertised in the NC for a journeyman chair-maker and added that he had "not declined the Business of Appraiser and Auctioneer".

By 1776 he had moved again, retaining the same sign of the tea-chest, but now in Charlotte Street and in the NM of 10/8/1776, he advertised that

he had "now finished several Pieces of elegant inlaid Furniture (which is now the Taste in London).."

In 1780 he moved again to "the house late in the Occupation of Henry Gooch, Esq., near the Hall on the Quay" (NM 18/3/1780). By 1782 he had "made two commodious Hot Baths at the Back of his House, with proper Conveniences for bathing in Sea or fresh Water..." (NM 1/6/1782). This, together with the rental of rooms, became the main focus of his advertising.

The marriage of his only daughter was announced in the NM of 29/7/1786 ("daughter of a very eminent Cabinet-maker") to a Mr. Holmes of London.

In the NM of 13/10/1787 he advertised the auctioning of all the furniture from Somerleyton Hall, near Lowestoft, particularly a very elegant solid mahogany book-case, 14 feet long and 10 feet 5 inches high; it separates into ten parts (exclusive of the cornice and plinth, which are each of them whole), five of them frame the book-case, with octagon sash doors, and five the pedestal, on the center of which is a secretary, and underneath it a wardrobe; on each side of the center is a case with five drawers, and the ends of the pedestal, having the same appearance as the center, is fitted up with shelves and partitions for port folios, &c.

Finally in the NM of 16/6/1792 he stated that he was "enabled to decline business in his Son's favour...N.B. The Hot Sea-water Bath and Lodgings as before".

There are 22 entries in the account books extending throughout this period. 3 bills survive, including that covering 1763 which was largely for refurbishing The Yellow Bedroom, including construction of a new bed, which had two "mahogany carved and fluted posts and 4 carved mahogany vauses" (£4-10-0) and was furnished with 37 yards of "best yellow cheney". The room was papered with "8 Pieces Yellow Paper" for £3-12-0, and there was a charge of £2-12-0 for "100 yds of Old Yellow Damask remaking cleaning dressing etc. @ 6d pr Yd."

Paul Colombine was the leading upholsterer of his time in Norwich. His father, François Colombine or le Colombine, was a Huguenot physician from Dauphiny (now Dauphiné) who fled to Norwich at the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes (1685), joining the already well-established French-speaking population from the earlier influx of Walloon weavers. Paul was the youngest of three sons, baptised at St. Clement's church on 16th February 1698, a year before his father died. The second son, Peter, became an eminent worsted weaver, was active in local politics and was elected Mayor in 1752.

Paul was apprenticed to William Braithwaite of Cornhill, London on 8/4/1714 and was admitted Freeman of the Upholders' Company on 2/8/1721. He presumably worked as a journeyman in London for a few years but advertised his own business at The Corner Shop opposite St Simon's Church, Norwich in the NG of 24/9/1726, "who makes Beds and Furniture after the Newest Model and sells them ready made, and all sorts of Upholstry Goods..."

He obtained his freedom of Norwich by purchase the following year (19/6/1727) and gave his address as St Peter Mancroft, although he retained his house in St Simon's parish. In the Assize Week in the September of that year he produced "both for the Entertainment of the Curious and Benefit of the Fortunate" a silk mohair bed to be raffled, with 90 entrants paying half a guinea each (NG 5/8/1727). The raffle was deferred due to insufficient interest on the first occasion; a new date was set and advertised in the NG and NM of 2/9/1727.

He advertised as an undertaker in the following year, declaring that he "has caused to be prepared a Set of all proper Ornaments for laying deceased Persons in State" (NM 24/2/1728ns).

In the NM of 16/1/1731ns he advertised the sale of his St Simon house, together with the house next door, "wherein Mr. Mayhew a Barber now dwell", with a third house "in which Mr. Buckenham lately dwelt" to be let. He advertised his business at the Golden Key, "the house where Mr. Fransham lately dwelt in the Market-place", noting that "there will be Accommodation for Raffling as usual during the Assize Week." (NG 31/7/1731). The following week some of Fransham's furnishings were offered for sale at the Golden Key: "a Silk Bed and quilt new fashion'd, together with a Mattress, and other Bedding thereto belonging, also two tapestry Cloths, and other Hangings in the same Room". In the same advertisement Fransham offered "two large Sash-Windows, Shop-Chests, and several other things" (NM 7/8/1731). Presumably the windows were removed refurbishment of the shop by Colombine.

In 1732 Colombine had a minor commission for the old Holkham Hall: "Mr. Columbine of Norwich by the hand of Mr Brettingham for Crimson Stuff Lace and Lines for three Window Curtains for Best Dining Room - £3-15-5". After a 9-year gap there was another small order in 1741, and on 10/9/1743 he was paid £33-9-0 for 111 yards of "crimson stuff damask", presumably as wall-covering, and £13-5-0 for labour. On 15/11/1746 he was paid £42-17-0 for "beding and work as per bill". These payments were probably for work in the family wing of the new hall which was in the process of being built. There is a more detailed account-book entry totalling £28-16-0 for 29/12/1753 for work in the Tower Rooms (i.e. the South-west family wing) for setting up a bed and for wallpaper, including the following: "Pd Columbine one weeks work £0-15-0. Pd his Man Kreyer 8 weeks work £6-0-0. Pd his man Notley 10 daies work £1-5-0", indicating payments of 15 shillings a week for work, whether it was done by Colombine himself or by his journeymen.

The final Holkham entry, dated 31/12/1757,

includes a payment for "Patterns of Damask sent to London £0-7-6". This would be for Thanet House, Lord Leicester's London house. As leading London figures such as Hallett, Vile & Cobb and Goodison were employed at Holkham it is interesting that Leicester considered ordering materials from a Norwich upholsterer for his London house.

During the same period Colombine was working at Wolterton Hall for Horatio Walpole, first Baron Walpole, brother of the Prime Minister, Sir Robert Walpole. The Wolterton account books show unitemised payments totalling £331–16–7 between 1739 and 1752, usually through William Notley, described as Colombine's servant, who became free in 1760, although working for Colombine as early as 1741.

As well as Notley, Colombine took the following apprentices: Nicholas Christopher Riches, 2/7/1745, 70 gns; Henry Withers, 20/7/1751, £45 (4 yrs); John Marks, 19/6/1754, 60 gns (6 yrs). He shared the apprentice Isaac Hoyle with Wodehouse Harmer, after Hoyle had initially been bound to Harmer alone. Hoyle was free on 3/5/1753. Finally William Bracey was free on 14/4/1781, long after Colombine's retirement, which was announced as follows:

NM 29/3/1760: Mr. Paul Colombine, Upholster, in the Market-Place, Norwich; having at Lady-Day last declined the said Business, is succeeded therein by his late Servants Notley and Marks, who...have taken the House and Shop lately occupied by the said Mr. Colombine...

Colombine's family were active members of the Church of St. Mary the Less, then, as now, known as The French Church, and on his death on 30th August 1784 he was commemorated by a mural tablet in the chancel as a man "whose temperance, industry, and moderation, thro' a long and blameless life, had merited and obtained the best and sweetest of human blessings, health, competence and content."

They also make it their Business to work at any Persons House, either in City or Country, at the usual Prices, if requested.

John Cox...continues to manufacture every article in the very best manner, and at prices as low as any house in the kingdom, regard being had to material and workmanship...J.C. from his extensive practice in fitting up Churches with Vestments, &c., most respectfully solicits the commands of the Rev. the Churchwardens, &c. in this department. He also solicits...an inspection of his various specimens of Wood, one of which is not to be procured in any part of the kingdom except at his Warehouse and of his immediate Agents. Funerals Completely Managed and Performed...Damasks, Moreens...Drawing, Dining-room, and every other description of Chairs...

Crane's career is well-documented as not only was he a prolific advertiser in the local press, but the correspondence which he and his widowed mother, Mary Crane, had with his uncle Thomas, a Preston ironmonger, was published over 100 years later in the *Preston Guardian* (see Appendix II).

Mary Crane's letter of 3/4/1762 documents Edward's desire to be an upholsterer rather than become, like his late father, a minister of the Presbyterian church - "It is here a very beneficial business, and great wages given to journeymen". Edward would be 12 or 13 at the time. Her next published letter, which appears to date from 1763, indicates that he is to be bound to Henry Withers, who had obtained his freedom only the previous year. Edward was to follow the normal practice of lodging with Withers, though on Sundays he was to go to his mother's. He actually started work on about 4th April and had two weeks "on liking", i.e. on approval, before being committed to the formal apprenticeship. The indenture was dated 1/5/1764 and the premium was £40 for a 7-year term. Premiums for Withers's subsequent apprentices rose to £50 and then £60. The relationship between master and apprentice was evidently an amicable one and he progressed well after some initial difficulties with "the use of the needle" [Mary's letter of 6/9/1764] Edward comments on the decline of the weaving business in his letters of 10/6/1768 and 19/1/1770, in the latter mentioning that "one gentleman of our congregation is broke for Sixty Thousand Pounds", no doubt a reference to Philip Stannard, whose expansion into the export trade had spectacularly failed. Edward fears that the upholstery business will be adversely affected by the number of bankruptcy sales.

He completed his apprenticeship in March 1771

and after contemplating working for a London master opted to become journeyman to Henry Bullen, upholsterer and auctioneer, of Bury St Edmunds, who had completed his own apprenticeship in Norwich 4 years previously. They evidently had a good working relationship, Bullen treating him more as a partner than an employee. He considered moving to Preston, where evidently his uncle had the ability to confer the freedom of the town on him.

After 3^{1/2} years with Bullen, Crane returned to Norwich and set up on his own at 15 London Lane, advertising his arrival in the *Norwich Mercury*:

NM 10/9/1774: Edward Crane, Upholder, Appraiser, and Auctioneer, Begs leave to acquaint his Friends and the Publick in general, that he has open'd a Shop at No. 15, London-Lane, Norwich, with an entire fresh Assortment of every Article in the Upholstery Business, which he is determined to make up and sell on the lowest Terms, and in the neatest Manner. The greatest Variety of the most fashionable Paper Hangings, Papier Mache Borders, &c. as low as from the Maker. N.B. Auctions & Appraisements transacted with Accuracy and Dispatch.

He wrote to his uncle on 3rd December that he had met with as much encouragement as he could expect. On 2/5/1776 he took his first apprentice, George Bishop, for a premium of only £15, which would suggest that he was a friend or relation. After Bishop he took the following apprentices: Robert Barlow, 2/8/1778, £24; Robert Brettingham, 29/12/1788, £60; William Hart, 21/4/1791, £60; Edward Prosser, 25/12/1793, £80 (5 yrs).

In a letter of 30/12/1777 his mother wrote that the auctioneering side of his business was doing particularly well.

In February 1779 he moved to larger premises a few doors down at no.2 London Lane, advertising the original property to let [NC 27/2/1779].

In May 1780 his mother wrote that he had become ill, having been confined for 3 months with a pain in his neck, unable to move his head from the pillow, but by November he wrote that he was better and had had no recurrence.

On 27/4/1782 he advertised the auction of the stock of John Watt, a cabinet-maker and chairmaker from further along London Lane, who had gone bankrupt, which rather contradicts Crane's fears that the increase in bankruptcies would be bad for the upholstery trade, at least for those that were also auctioneers.

From 1783 to 1788 Crane gave his address as No. 43, New Buildings, London Lane, and it is not clear whether this was in addition to No. 2 or in replacement. The earliest advertisement from this address gives a good idea of the range of his stock: Edward Crane, Upholder...At NM 3/5/1783: No. 43, the New Buildings, in the London-lane, Norwich, Sells on the Lowest Terms, Wholesale and Retail, Ticks, Blankets, Counterpanes, Rugs, Quilts, Feather-beds, Bedsteads, Rods, Bed Sattins, Moreens, moreen'd Cheneys, Harrateens, Dernicks, Furniture Checks, Wilton, Scotch and List Carpets, Sacking Bottoms, Sacking and Matting of all Widths, Hair Seating, and curl'd Hair; the greatest variety of the newest Patterns of Paper Hangings, Buckram, Laces, Lines, Fringes and Tassels of all Colours, Curtain Rings, Cloak Pins, Brass Nails and Bed Castors.He likewise makes up, on the shortest Notice, and in the genteelest Taste, every article in the Upholstery Business, and keeps Beds always ready for Sale. Auctioneering in all its various Branches and Goods appraised and sold by Hand. The best Price for Feathers and Bees wax.

This advertisement indicates that the emphasis at this time was very much on bed furniture, but by the next year he had opened a repository in Sir Benjamin Wrench's Court (off Pottergate Street), "always open for taking in upon Commission, or buying, selling, or exchanging all Sorts of neat Houshold Furniture, Eight elegant Cabriole Chairs, covered with Silk Damask, two Sophas, a Wardrobe, &c. &c. now to sell. N.B. Auctions and Appraisements transacted with Honour and Dispatch." [NM 15/5/1784].

The repository is already quoted as an address (127 Pottergate St.) in the 1783 directory.

Henceforth Crane's advertisements suggest that he had become as much a furniture broker as an upholsterer, selling new and second-hand chairs, cabinet goods, beds, tables and looking-glasses at his repository and bed-furnishings and wallpaper at London Lane:

NM 22/4/1786: Edward Crane, Up...43...Begs leave to inform the Public, that he is just returned from London, and has laid in a fresh Assortment of every Article in the Upholstery Branch, particularly the greatest Variety of the most elegant Patterns of Paper Hangings, from Fourpence Halfpenny to Seven-pence a Yard. - Furniture made up on the shortest Notice, in the genteelest Taste, and on the lowest Terms. - Elastic Cloths, made of real Spanish Wool, so generally worn and approved of for Lightness,

Ease and Durability, sold by Commission. N.B. At his Repository are now on Sale, a Bedstead with fluted Posts, and Blue Manchester Hangings, fring'd, two Sophas, an elegant Mahogany Wardrobe, several Sets of Mahogany Chairs, Night, Dining and Card Tables.

NM 13/10/1787: Edward Crane, Up...Begs leave to acquaint the public, that he has now on Sale at his Repository in Sir Benjamin Wrench's Court, Norwich, several Dozen good Mahogany Chairs, both brass nailed and Pincushion seats, an excellent four post Bracketed Bedstead, with Mahogany Posts and Crimson Worsted Damask Hangings, a green Worsted Damask ditto, a check ditto, Pier Glasses in gilt Frames, a large Pier Glass 45 inches by 24, with various other Articles; and that at his Warehouse in the London Lane he has laid in for the Winter Trade, a large Assortment of Blankets, Rugs, Quilts, Tickings, Carpets, and every Article in the Upholstery Branch, which he sells on the most reasonable Terms. The greatest variety of Paper Hangings. N.B. Auctions and Appraisals transacted with Honour and Dispatch.

He was a respected figure in the community and was appointed Coroner to the City of Norwich in May 1788. In December of that year he announced that he had moved again:

NM 6/12/1788: Edward Crane, Upholsterer... is removed from his late house in the London-lane, to No. 11, the end of the White-Lion-Lane, next the Back of the Inns, facing the Market where he continues to sell and make up every article in the Upholstery Branch, on the lowest terms

His stock came mainly from London, to which he made frequent visits:

NC 19/6/1790: Edward Crane...just returned from London...every article in the Upholstery Paper-Hanging and Carpet branches, likewise painted and Mahogany Chairs, Glasses and Mahogany Furniture...

The following year he announced that he was selling off the cabinet and chair stock at prime cost as he was "leaving off that branch of business" [NM 13/8/1791]. Another advertisement announced that "he has finished, by way of specimen, a Bed exactly the same as those made up for the Prince of Wales at Carleton-house, upon a new plan, and adapted both for elegance and use" [NM 30/3/1793].

By 1794 he was ill again and in June of the following year announced as follows:

NC 20/6/1795: Norwich, White-Lion-lane.

Edward Crane, Upholder. Having been for eight months past prevented attending to his Business by a violent rheumatic complaint, finds himself obliged to relinquish the Trade...desirous of treating with any Person who is disposed to take the Stock, &c...will as far as lies in his power, recommend his successor...thanks for...Favours for the last 20 years...purposes selling and making up every Article...till the Shop (which is now in full trade) is disposed of...

His cabinet stock was auctioned in November and the upholstery stock in December:

NM 31/10/1795: ...Auction...All the Elegant and Useful Cabinet Stock in Trade of Mr. Edward Crane, in the White Lion Lane, Norwich; (retiring from business) consisting of a variety of excellent mahogany dining tables, handsome mahogany chairs, with carved backs and brass nailed, an elegant set of cabriole chairs, stuft in silk taberet, pier and standing glasses...fine toned harpsichord...Catalogues...

The Capital Dwelling-House, and Shop, to be let (with, or without, the Upholstery Stock) at Christmas next. The Upholstery Stock continues to be sold at Prime Cost.

NM 19/12/1795:...Auction...The valuable and fresh Upholstery Stock of Mr. Edward Crane, who on occasion of ill Health is obliged to decline Business, consisting of One Thousand Lots in moreens, damasks, cheneys and darnicks... carpets...paper hangings... Catalogue... Edward Crane's respectful compliments...hopes of...attendance at the sale...The House, Warehouses and Shop...well calculated for a Boarding House or a very large Business, comprising a spacious shop, compting house, excellent Kitchen, cellars, stone-yard, 10 bed and two dining rooms, with a large warehouse over the whole, to be Let and entered upon immediately.

Having retired from what was now, clearly, a very substantial and profitable business he moved to Yarmouth and, whatever the nature of his illness, he finally succumbed the following December:

NM 31/12/1796: Died...Yesterday se'nnight...at Yarmouth, aged 47, Mr. Edward Crane, upholder and auctioneer, and lately one of the Coroners for this city and liberties.

A sofa has recently come to light in the upholstery workshop of Norfolk antique dealer Mike Hicks, bearing the words "Crane [No]rwich" on the hessian revealed on removal of the covering fabric (Pls. 10 & 11). The lettering appears to have been applied with a paint-brush and was probably to

indicate the destination of a roll of hessian supplied to Crane.

A Subscription has been entered upon for their relief, which we hope will proceed liberally...

NM 13/5/1820:...C. Crowe, Cabinet-Maker and Upholsterer, King Street, Yarmouth,... thanks...support during many years...selling off the whole of his Stock-in-Trade...being about to decline Business in favour of his Son-in-Law, Mr. T. Haynes...

NM 30/11/1833: Died. On Thursday morning, at Yarmouth, much respected, after a short illness, Mr. Charles Crow, formerly a cabinet-maker, of the above town, in the 70th year of his age.

The above will be...sold without reserve...(as Mr. Crow must quit the premises.), and will be expressed in catalogues...

By 1825 he was "compelled" to move again to Pottergate Street [NC 3/12/1825].

In 1831 he denied rumours that he was declining business but stated that he was relinquishing the retail trade, selling off 3000 yards of Brussels, Kidderminster and Venetian carpet, 1000 pieces of paper and 100 yards of "capital" ticking and mattress stripes, 1000 yards of choice moreen and a large assortment of "acrontiques", for which I can find no definition in English or French dictionaries [NM 3/9/1831 & 22/10/1831]. By the following month he had moved again, to St. Stephen's Back Street, where he had "erected convenient Work-shops for carrying on the Upholstery Manufacture, Paper Hanging, &c. in all its Branches" [NM 19/11/1831].

He ceased trading in 1834 and announced the following auction:-

The FREEMANS. The Freeman family, or families, are something of a nightmare for the researcher. In this respect they are second only to the Norrises. Among the outstanding problems are:

- 1) The site of the London Lane business. We know that Jeremiah Freeman moved from No. 9 to No. 2 in 1795. London Lane then ran from Swan Lane (shown on the map as Backy Lane) to the Red Well. The numbers then ran from 1-45, starting from the west end on the south side, continuing along the south side and returning along the north side. (This numbering system is explained in Chase's 1789 Directory). Number 2 would therefore be opposite Swan Lane. Both the William Freemans, the cabinet-maker and the carver & gilder, gave No. 2 as their address in newspaper advertisements, but the carver & gilder gave his address on trade cards as London and Swan Lanes, suggesting that he was on the corner of the two roads, on the other side of London Lane from No. 2.
- 2) The paternity of John Freeman, jun. The freemen register states that he was admitted as the son of Edward Freeman and yet when he set up business in 1812 at 12 Market Place, the shop of John Freeman sen., who had just died, he stated that he was carrying on his late father's business.
- 3) The William Freeman problem. It seems unavoidable that there were two William Freemans, one a carver & gilder and one a cabinet-maker, both operating from 2 London Lane at the same time.

Needlework of all sorts neatly and elegantly framed, with drawings for embroidery & Italian pencil work.

NM 6/4/1793: Last Saturday Mr. Knights exhibition was honored with a visit from her Majesty and the Princesses, accompanied by Mr. Earl of Alysbury [sic]; Lady Charlotte Finch, Lady Harcourt, &c. at No. 136 New Bond-street. The entrance to the grand staircase was fitted up in the style of an elegant pantheon. Her Majesty and all the royal visitors were pleased to express their

approbation of the grandeur and taste displayed throughout the whole of the manufacture and their surprise that in such an infant state girls should be able to render themselves so very useful in embroidering shawls, &c. Their stay in the different rooms was about an hour...Much to the credit of Mr. Knights, the whole of this most superb exhibition was compleated in Norwich; the overmantel carving and gilding was executed by Mr. Jeremiah Freeman, the cabinet work by Mr. John Freeman, and the upholstery by Messrs. T. and C. Taylor; the outside ornaments, so justly admired, were designed by Mr. Rooks and executed by Mr. Ninham.¹⁷

NM 23/3/1811. Soon after midnight of Saturday last a fire was discovered in the warehouses of Messrs. Culley, grocers, St. Peter's Mancroft. Perhaps it was scarcely possible for the dreadful calamity to have occurred in a situation where the materials of combustion were in more dreadful abundance than upon this very spot. The warehoues were filled with oil, treacle, sugar, and other dry articles. About half-past one o'clock, the alarm having been given by the customary signs of fire, the people began to assemble, and the door of the warehouse being opened, exhibited a tremendous spectacle of flame...The adjoining house was a new and substantial building with a parapet wall, and in the occupation of its proprietor, Mr. Freeman, cabinet-maker. In his warehouses and shop were deposited elegant furniture of all descriptions, and dry wood ready to make up. About three o'clock it was, however, apparent that the party wall

could afford no protection to the premises, for the flames had already reached the roof. It was now that great fears were entertained for the residence of Messrs. Weston and the Pope's Head, which were in immediate contiguity with the houses on fire, but the barrack engine played with such effect on the side of Mr. Freeman's house, that apprehension was soon silenced...warehouses where the fire commenced were burnt to the ground, together with almost half the property they contained, the chambers over them and a part of the shop. Mr. Freeman's shop was the only portion of his premises preserved; and from the rapidity with which the flames spread, it was with the utmost difficulty that the light articles were saved, and these sustained the greatest damage by removal... Mr. Culley had indeed a narrow escape, as he awoke and found his room, which was over the warehouses, filled with smoke, in time to avoid the calamity.

A fire of such importance has not occurred for many years in Norwich... Messrs. Culley are insured in the Albion Office for 3800l. and Mr. Freeman in the Equitable for 1600l. The Volunteer Regiment and the Norwich Riflemen were upon guard until the premises were secured from depradation. The hall in the market was thrown open for reception of such property as could be removed, where it still remains...The loss is presumed to be between 8 and 10,000l. We have the pleasure of observing that the repairs of Mr. Freeman's House have been begun... promptitude which the Equitable Office has shewn in repairing the losses of its Insurer.

NM 23/3/1811: ... John Freeman... acknowledge the great benefit... exertions of various Persons who assisted at the late Fire...large quantity of valuable Furniture was saved. He also wishes to impress on the public mind that there is no foundation whatever for a report in circulation of his denying access to his House for removal of Furniture, as it naturally commenced immediately on the alarm of fire being given. J.F. solicits the indulgence... for a short time... Upper Market... Orders received at Mrs. Graham's, next door, till the premises are rebuilt.

Freeman inserted notices in the NM to inform customers that due to the fire he had moved his stock to the Exhibition Room, Sir Benjamin Wrench's Court [NM 6/4/1811] and that, after 6 months, he had reopened at No. 12 Upper Market [NM 5/10/1811].

NM 5/12/1812: On Monday morning died, aged 60, Mr. John Freeman, cabinet-maker, of the

Upper Market. He attended divine service twice the preceding day, at St. Peter's Church, and retired to bed in perfect health; after which he was seized with an apoplectic fit, and expired immediately.

Much of William's work was labelled. The earliest known label is on a torchèËre at Felbrigg, 31 and reads:

Jeremiah & William Freeman, Carvers, Gilders, & Looking-glass Manufacturers, Wholesale & Retail, No. 2 London-lane, Norwich.

The same father-and-son label was recorded on a looking-glass sold by Christies, South Kensington on 10/1/2001. This was followed by a more elaborate label, probably introduced after Jeremiah's death in 1823. This label goes into considerable detail of the nature of the Freeman enterprise. It has been recorded on a number of different varieties of looking-glasses and dressingtable mirrors and it has also survived as a billhead on a bill dated 1829 (after Jeremiah's death (Pl. 15). A W. Freeman label found on a picture frame at Norwich Castle Museum now survives only as a photocopy (Pl. 16). A pair of rosewood side cabinets were sold by Sotheby's on 23/11/2005 bearing an otherwise unrecorded label on one shelf reading "Freeman's, Furniture, Carving, Gilding and Plate, St. Andrew's, Norwich" (Pl. 17). By the 1840s Freeman;s were stencilling their name on the base of case furniture (see Pls. 18 & 19). Stylistically it appears to date from the 1840s. In the 1850s and 1860s directories suggest that the London Street shop was managed by William's sons, William Philip Barnes (qv) and Charles Jeremiah. The latter was admitted to the freedom as upholsterer, son of William, in 1843. A davenport bearing his stencil in a drawer has been recorded." During this period the address was given as 37 London St. I have been unable to establish whether this was No. 2 London Lane renumbered or whether the business had moved. Renumbering must have occurred when Cockey Lane was incorporated into London Street and probably again when the road was widened in 1856. In 1870 the business was taken over by William Boswell (qv).

The unmanufactured Stock, the sale of which begins on the third of June, consists of upwards of twenty thousand feet of very fine dry Spanish and other mahogany, in boards, planks and logs, satin, rose and tulip wood, a large quantity of fine Spanish and other veneers, some fine wainscot boards, deals, &c., &c. Also a large quantity of fashionable brass work for furniture locks, hair seating, &c., &c...

NM 6/6/1795: Notice to Creditors. Such Persons as have any Demands on Mr. Christopher Gilney, Cabinet-maker, Norwich, are particularly requested to meet the Trustees of his Effects at the King's Head in Norwich on Thursday next...

Free by purchase 11/11/1797. He was 50 and had already been working for at least 10 years. It is possible that this was a son, but it would then be surprising that his nephew, Robert Margerum, took over the business when Gilney died in 1807. P 1799, 1802, 1806.

A neoclassical mahogany side table bearing fragments of a Michael Godman Coward paper label was sold by Bonhams on 8/4/2003 (Pls. 21 & 22). A pencilled inscription "[Ma]de at Godman Cowards Manufactory Swaffham" has also been found on the underside of a drawer in a chest-of-drawers by Mike Hicks of Stalham Antique Gallery (Pls 23 & 24). Both pieces show a degree of sophistication and quality not usually found in the work of a small country workshop. The chest-of-drawers is veneered in mahogany with satinwood cross-banding and has original handles of an unusual design.

NC 5/5/1781: Escaped from Justice - James Gooch. Late of the Parish of St. Michael at Coslany, in the City of Norwich, Cabinet and Chair-Maker, who stands charged with divers Felonies; on searching his House, &c. a large Quantity of Mahogany Planks and Boards with Upwards of one hundred and thirty Wainscot Boards were found, which are claimed, the Mahogany as being the property of three reputable Cabinet-Makers; and the Wainscot is also proved, upon Oath, to be the Property of Mr. Robert Jollins, Timber-merchant. - A much larger Quantity could not be claimed, as the Marks are planed off. Whoever shall apprehend the said James Gooch, and bring him before the Mayor of this City, or any of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said City and County of Norwich, shall receive a reward of Ten Guineas, to be paid by the Sword-bearer.

N.B. The said James Gooch was born in or near King's Lynn, in Norfolk, and served Part of his Apprenticeship with a Carpenter in that Neighbourhood. – He is about twenty-six Years of Age, and is about Five Feet Six Inches high, has a thin Visage, and swarthy Complexion, with dark brown lank Hair, short cut, and brown Eyes, usually wears a fustian Frock and Waistcoat, and stoops very much in walking.

NM 7/7/1781: Sunday morning was apprehended at Ditchinham, near Bungay, and committed to the city gaol by the Right Worshipful the Mayor, James Gooch, of this city, cabinet-maker, charged with stealing a large quantity of mahogany planks and boards, together with 130 wainscot boards, the property of several reputable cabinet-makers of this city. Ten pounds reward was advertised for apprehending him.

NM 11/8/1781:... Assizes...For the City of Norwich. James Gooch, charged on eight different indictments...stealing...out of the different yards and premises of Robert Jollins, timber merchant, Edward Thorn, cabinet-maker, Thomas Smith, cabinet-maker, Michael Baldwin, coach-maker, Mary Goodwin, William Elden Earl, cabinet-maker, Lydia Watts, widow, coach-maker, and Nathaniel Lock, millwright,

was sentenced to three years hard labour on the river Thames.

The Stock consists of Mahogany Chests of Drawers, Dining, Card, and other Tables, a large quantity of Jamb and Dressing Glasses, Chairs, Tea Boards, Tea Chests, Night Stools, and Mahogany Bureaus, &c. The Goods were not made for a common Sale Trade, but of exceeding good dry Wood, and by the best Workmen, and must be sold without Reserve, Mr. Goodwin leaving Norwich.....

During his years in trade Gray was easily the most prolific advertiser in the local press. He was clearly a highly successful entrepreneur with a constantly expanding business. His advertisements were usually spread across two columns, headed by giant lettering, and exhibited a tendency to hyperbole reminiscent of Hollywood in its heyday.

He purchased his freedom as a cabinet-maker on 19/6/1815, but had already been operating from Dove Lane for 4 years, advertising in the NM of 19/10/1811 that, as a cabinet and chair manufacturer he was selling, not only furniture, but ironmongery and japanned ware "20 per cent under the usual prices." The large size of his stock and its cheapness are constant themes. The first expansion of his warehouse was advertised in 1821:

NM 20/10/1821: Great Bargains. 10, Dove Lane. J.Gray Begs to acknowledge...enlarged his

premises and has now to offer a most extensive and elegant stock...chairs, sofas, chaise longes, sideboards, wardrobes, dining, card, sofa, loo, and other tables, 10,000 yards of superfine Brussels and other carpets, from 5s per yard...for Ready Money only...The Trade supplied with Mahogany Veneers, Fancy Woods, and every other article, on the London Terms for Cash.

This was also the first mention of his supply of wood for the trade, which was to become an important part of his business.

In 1822 he advertised that he had for his clients' inspection:

2000 drawing, dining and chamber chairs, with every description of cabinet goods of his own manufacturing...500 looking glasses – 6000 pieces of paper hangings...Those who may favour him with their commands will find a saving of 40 per Cent [NM 29/6/1822].

The claimed saving of 40 per cent provoked the wrath of Richard Bexfield (qv) who responded with an advertisement stating that for equal quality his prices could not be beaten.

Six months later Gray was advertising that he had over 40,000 feet of well-seasoned mahogany for sale [NM 29/6/1822].³⁶ Five years later he had 80,000 feet of timber [NM 21/4/1827] and by 1831 he offered the Trade:

Mahogany, Rosewood, Zebra, and Fancy Woods in Logs, Planks, Boards and Veneers, from a stock of 120,000 feet at the lowest London Prices...[NM 5/3/1831].

This had grown to 150,000 feet by 1833 [NM 13/4/1833], 180,000 feet by 1836 [NM 12/3/1836] and 200,000 feet by 1839 [NM 2/3/1839]. These very large stocks of timber support his assertion that his cabinet goods were of his own manufacture and he comments in one advertisement [5/7/1834] on alterations to his manufacturing premises.

Apprentices documented as obtaining their freedom were: Allun Watts, free 3/5/1829; Joshua Browne, free 27/9/1832; George Guyton and George Priest, both free 25/7/1838; and Henry Watson Kett, free 1/3/1842.

He seems to have thrived in 1830-31 when the trade was depressed, advertising that:

from the very distressed state of Trade he has made most extensive purchases...carpets...Rich Indian Silk Damasks...Four-post Bedsteads with moreen hangings from £5-5s. French, Tent and other Bedsteads, Featherbeds (warranted free from dust or smell) from £5-5s, Chaise Lounges, Sofas, &c. from £3-3s...patent Spring Seats,

Sofas, &c. ...Cabinet Furniture...[NM 6/3/1830]. A year later he boasted of the most valuable Assemblage now for inspection ever exhibited in Norwich...To purchase immediately will proved a great advantage and saving, as there is a general advance on all unmanufactured materials. [NM 5/3/1831].

A month later he denied rumours that he was about to decline business and stated that the reason for taking down part of his ware-rooms was for the purpose of extending and enlarging them [NM 4/4/1831]. Again in 1838 he was extending his ware-rooms on account of the great increase of business...and is now enabled to offer The Largest and Most Valuable Stock Ever Before Exhibited, consisting of every description of Furniture, from the plainest to the most splendid style... [NM24/3/1838].

In the following year he was expanding again: ...Immense reduction in price, it being necessary to clear the show-rooms preparatory to making Extensive Alterations and Improvements...Patent Recumbent and other Easy Chairs in the greatest variety. Dr. Calvert's Digestion Chairs...300 Looking Glasses... [NM 2/3/1839].

He seems to have finally over-extended himself in 1840: NM 22/2/1840 and subsequent weeks:

Immense Sale of Upholstery and Cabinet Goods at a Great sacrifice, as the whole must be Immediately Turned into Cash. Dove Street. J. Gray Informs the Nobility, Clergy, Gentry, and Public, that the whole of his Extensive, Splendid, and Valuable Stock must be Sold under peculiar circumstances, without reserve, for ready money, at prices never before offered...Any one having a claim upon him are requested to send in their accounts, that they may be immediately discharged. All unsettled accounts (through neglect of his terms of business) are requested to be Paid Immediately, as the whole must be balanced without delay. The Stock Consists of 194 Loo, Card, Occasional, Dining, Writing, Pembroke, Washing and Dressing Tables, &c. 950 Fauteuil, Recumbent, Victoria, Dining Room, Drawing Room, Library, and Chamber Chairs, 24 Sofas, Lounges, and Nelson Seats. 46 Wardrobes and Chests with Drawers, 390 Looking Glasses, in rich Gilt, Mahogany and Fancy Wood Frames, 10,500 Pieces of Paper Hangings...

Finally, he advertised in the NM of 19/6/1841 that he was retiring and that the business was being taken over by T. Smith, who having conducted his business for many years so much to the satisfaction of his numerous friends, possesses

from his long experience and well cultivated taste, together with the highly respectable and opulent partner with whom he is connected, a Full Command of the Trade in All its Various Branches." He is quoted as "Smith & Co." at 10 Dove Street in the 1842 Directory, but is otherwise mysteriously unrecorded.

A Joseph Gray label removed from a picture frame is illustrated in Pl. 26.

John Horth was the son of a cutler, Thomas Horth, and was apprenticed to the upholsterer William Brooke in August 1771 (registered on 22/1/1772) for 7 years at the age of 12, for the relatively high premium of £76. On completion of his apprenticeship in August 1778 he took over his master's business in White Lion Lane [NC 8/8/1778], though he was not declared free until 3/3/1781, as son of his cutler father. He was married 3 months later to Ann Sibell," who died in 1797.

He took out a Sun Fire policy, no. 401262, on 4/8/1778 for £50 on his house and £250 for the stock therein.

For 7 years from 1782 he succeeded William Brooke as James Woodforde's upholsterer, after which he was superseded by James Sudbury. Typical entries in Woodforde's diaries include:

Vol. 10, p. 33. 24/4/1782: Bespoke of my Upholsterer, Horth, two pairs of Blankets 1 Pr of 16s/od – the other of 12s/od – I bespoke also of him a Matrass for my Bed.

Vol. 10, p. 140. 5/6/1783: Called on my Upholsterer Horth and bespoke a Bolster Tick and some Paper to paper one of my Garretts.

Vol. 12, p. 4. 12/1/1788: Nancy [his niece] was highly pleased with the new Sofa – It is covered with Crimson Check and Mohogany Feet. Am to give Mr. Horth for the same – 5/5/o.

Horth took apprentices Thomas Jarvis, 2/5/1782, £45, free 18/6/1792: David Elliot, 14/6/1785, £50, free 22/9/1805; Joseph Dowson, 6/10/1790, £55 (Horth & Scott); William David, 9/11/1793, £50 (Horth & Scott). Free 21/9/1804. As with Horth himself there is a considerable gap between the completion of these 7-year apprenticeships and the obtaining of freedom, particularly in the case of David Elliot, with a gap of 13 years.

Directories from 1783 to 1805 give his address as 17 White Lion Lane, though the 1783 directory incorrectly quotes him at No. 18. Poll books from 1784 to 1799 confirm this St Peter Mancroft address.

The 1802 Norfolk poll-book also indicates that he had a freehold in Tasburgh, south of Norwich, still quoted in the 1817 poll book.

In 1789 Horth took John Scott into partnership [NC 30/5/1789], operating from 17 White Lion Lane. The partnership was dissolved in 1797 [NC 25/2/1797].

On 20/1/1806 he married a widow, Ann Cooper, at St John at Hackney church. Four months later he announced his retirement [NC 3/5/1806], and in July a notice indicated that he was insolvent: NC 19/7/1806: ... Auction... By Order of the Assignees of Mr. John Horth, on Monday, July 21, and four following days, (also on Monday, the 28th, will be sold the remaining part of the Furniture, fixtures, and Utensils in Trade, Chaise, Harness, and Chaise-house), All the Stock in Trade, and Household Furniture, on his premises in the White Lion-lane, Norwich; comprising a quantity of Brussels, Venetian and Kidderminster carpets, bed ticks, 2000 yards of ell and yardwide bed furnitures, counterpanes, hearth rugs, 300 pieces of paper and borders, laces, fringes, brass work, painted and mahogany chairs, a superb four post bedstead, with real chintz

furniture, drapery, valents lined with blue calico...two side boards, chest with drawers, biddies, night table, &c., &c. The Household furniture comprises...Catalogues...N.B. A Light Gig and Harness.

In 1810 he had evidently recovered sufficiently to set up business as upholder and appraiser in the former Anchor Fire Office in London Lane, St Andrew [NM 21/4/1810], although the 1811 directory gives his address as the neighbouring Swan Lane. He moved to Davey Place, St Peter Mancroft by 1818 [NM 3/1/1818 and P 1818] and his final poll book entry is in 1820 at St Saviour, where he was probably a resident of Doughty's Hospital. He died in 1822, aged 63, and his burial was recorded in North Burlingham Parish Register on 3/9/1811.

In the NM of 2/11/1816 Lane advertised his St Lawrence premises for sale by private contract, "well calculated for carrying on any large manufacturing concern, having every requisite convenience, such as workshops, yardroom &c", and offered his stock in trade for sale. However poll books still listed him at St. Lawrence up to 1824.

He moved to 42 Carnaby Street, London, the premises of a cabinet-maker called Watson, where he took out a Sun insurance policy on 1/5/1780 for £300, including £100 for utensils & stock at Carnaby Street and £125 for utensils & stock in a

workshop behind a bookbinder in King Street, Golden Square. However by 1782 he was back in Dove Lane (No. 12), being listed as Samuel Lawrence, household broker, in the 1783 directory.

Poll books from 1784 to 1790 listed him variously as cm or up in St John Maddermarket but he moved to St Andrew's Plain in 1793:

Took app Edward Horn, 28/4/1774, £20, cm; William Duckett, 4/1/1775, £5 (4 yrs) (Leggett); Thomas Fuller, 6/7/1778, £20, cm; James Bland Potter, free 21/9/1789 (Leggat); James Wigg, 27/1/1787, £21, cm.

NM 4/11/1775: An Apprentice ran away, Joseph Youngman, Joiner and Cabinet-maker, from his Master Samuel Leggatt, in St. Andrew's, Norwich. The above Joseph Youngman is about Four Feet nine Inches high, 18 Years of Age, short flaxen Hair, sullen look. Had on when he went away a light coloured plain Fustian Coat, with white Metal Buttons, took with him a light blue Suit of Cloth Cloaths, with white Buttons. – The above is, that he may be apprehended and brought to Justice. N.B. Whoever harbours or employs him, will be prosecuted to the utmost

severity of the Law. See Joseph Youngman.

NM 11/10/1777: To be Sold, two Estates, in Bridewell-Alley, in Norwich, consisting of two exceeding good Shops and Dwelling-Houses, in the Occupation of Mr. Samuel Leggett, Cabinet-Maker and Mr...

Wolterton Hall accounts 23/9/1780: Sam Leggatt for 2 wainscott tables for Steward's parlour £2/13/6.

D 1783 - up, carp, apsr, Corner of Bridewell Alley (Leggett).

NM 21/9/1793: Retiring from Business, On Sale without Reserve. S. Leggatt [misprinted as J. Leggatt in no. of 14/9/93] informs the Public that the remaining Part of his Stock in the Upholstery and Cabinet Branches is removed for Sale from his late Shop in Bridewell Alley to his Premises in the Lobster-street and Sir Benj. Wrench's Court. The Assortment comprises beds standing complete, carpets, Persia, Wilton, Kedminster and Scotch; blankets, tickings, quilts, coverlids, counterpanes, &c. mahogany and other chair, wardrobes, bureaus, bookcases, dressing and other drawers, jamb and swing glasses, tea chests, caddies, trays, wine cisterns, &c. &c. As the Proprietor is declining Trade, the whole is selling at reduced prices.

NM 13/9/1794: Died...Saturday last, at his house in Sir Benjamin Wrench's-Court, in the 70th year of his age, Mr. Samuel Leggatt, who after upwards of forty years attention to business in St. Andrew's, had lately retired to the enjoyment of private life. His character and conduct thro' life were truly respectable.

NM 1/11/1794: ...Auction...Nov. 10 1794, and following days, The Stock in Trade of Mr. Sam. Leggat, Cabinet-Maker, deceased, at his late dwelling-house in Sr Benjamin Wrench's Court, Norwich, consisting of mahogany wardrobes, bureau bedsteads, dining and other tables, chairs of various kinds, carpets, cheney and linsy for bed furniture, many looking-glasses, dinner trays, and looking-glass plates; tea-boards and various other articles...

At least 2 gilt chairs at Felbrigg bear the pencilled inscription "Leggett" on the inner aspect of a seat side rail, but the inscription looks like the work of a later re-upholsterer. The chairs probably date from the 1820s.

NC 14/4/1798: ...Persons...any Demands on...Mr. James Mills late of Swaffham, in Norfolk, Cabinet and Chair Maker...send an account...to Mr. James Johnson of Swaffham, Ironmonger...

LESLEY, James, cm, Wells (1750b-1807d).

4/5/1781 Married Sarah Pursglove [Quaker Register of Births, Marriages and Deaths, Norwich Heritage Centre, ref. Microfilm MF/RO 320/6].

NM 29/10/1785: Wanted, a Journeyman Chair and Cabinet-maker...Likewise an Apprentice... Apply to James Lesley, Wells.

D 1791 (Lessley) - joi & cm.

NM 8/9/1792: Went off in the night of the 3d of July last, Thomas Mace, an Apprentice to James Lesley, Cabinet Maker, in company with John Clark Freeland, a travelling sawyer...Wanted two Journeymen, a Cabinet-Maker, and a Chair Maker, good workmen, who have tools suited to the above branches, may have constant work; the same prices will be given as in London, by the journeyman cabinet maker's price-book, and the expence of carriage of tools will be allowed likewise &c. Pair of Sawyers are Wanted, that are well acquainted with cutting Veneers. Also an Apprentice Wanted - To prevent trouble, the premium is thirty guineas, and for six years.

Took apps with John Leslie: Wm Beckerton, 14/2/1803, £10 (6 yrs 4m); Daniel Basham, 21/10/1803, £10, (5 yrs). [Both spelt Lesley in IR accounts. Note discrepancy between premiums and those announced in the above advertisement]. Died 12/5/1807.**

LESLIE, John, cm, Church Street, Wells (1803-1845).

Spelt Leslie in directories and the Holkham Hall accounts, but Lesley in the Inland Revenue accounts.

Took apps with James Lesley in 1803 – see James Lesley.

There are numerous entries for Leslie in the Holkham Hall account books from 1812 to 1837. Many of these were for supplying mahogany and other timber for the use of the estate carpenter, H.

Savage. Others were for the supply of furniture, including one dated 31/7/1819: John Leslie, his 1/1 years accot. for various mahogany furniture &c. &c. to Holkham £86-9-21/1. Some of the accounts refer to him as an upholsterer and the later accounts include several for wall-papering, not normally the province of a cabinet-maker!

He appears as a cabinet-maker or cabinet-maker and chair-maker in directories from 1822 to 1845.

LEVERETT, Henry, cm, Harleston (1797).

NM 21/10/1797: Henry Leverett of Harleston...cabinet-maker, having this day assigned over all his Estate and Effects to Trustees; for the equal benefit of his Creditors...N.B. The Trade carried on at the Shop, for the present, as usual.

LEVERINGTON, Robert, cm, Bedlam Street; then Next Door to the Rampant Horse, St Stephen; then St John Timberhill, Norwich (1772–1796). Partner of Edward Thorne, qv, who died in 1786. James Woodforde Diary, Vol. 7, p. 75: 27/9/1776 ...Mr. Leverington Partner with Mr. Thorne came to my House this morning to put up the multiplying Wheel to my Jack &c. and he dined & spent the Afternoon but made no stay... Vol. 7, p. 80. 22/10/1776 ...Mr. Leverington Partner with Thorne called on me this morning to Dunn me for some Money, but could not afford to let him have any, however I promised to let him have 10 Pounds on Friday next ...Mr. Leverington dined & spent the Afternoon with us.

Took app William Blomfield, 23/2/1796, 11gns [St John Timberhill specified].

LEVI, Immanuel, auc app up cm chm jeweller, Wells (1811-1825).

NM 24/8/1811: Norfolk Assizes. Levi v. Priest...plaintiff, who is an upholder at Wells, to recover the value of a bed, purchased of him by the defendant...

NM 28/10/1820: Immanuel Levi, Auctioneer and Appraiser, Upholsterer, Cabinet and Chair Maker, Wells, Norfolk...receives...Gold and Silver Watches, Plate, Jewellery, Cabinet and Upholstery Goods...

D 1822 – under "cms, chms and jois" (Emanuel). NC 9/7/1825: Cabinet Manufactory and Jeweller's Shop...Auction...Freehold...Wells next the Sea...Dwelling-house, with convenient shops, warehouses, yards and other outbuildings...lately in the occupation of Mr. Immanuel Levi, Auctioneer, Cabinet Maker, and Jeweller, who has conducted therein a large business in those lines for many years...

LEVI, Jacob, up, Wells (1801-1819).

Like Thomas Bouch, Levi hired beds to Holkham Hall for the annual sheep shearing fairs in 1801 and 1808. He supplied mahogany "draws"

and presses (account dated 13/1/1811) for £8-4-6. A final bill for "various upholstery to Holkham by order of Mrs. Scott" was paid on 9/3/1819.

He does not appear in directories, and it is possible that he is the same man as Immanuel Levi.

LEWES, Edward Tyler, cm chm, Back of the Inns, St Peter Mancroft; then 110 Magdalen St., Norwich (1757-1783).

Sometimes spelt Lewis

8/6/1757 Apprenticed to William Kendall, £25 (Edward Taylor Lewis). Reapprenticed to Edward Sutleffe (Sutleff) on 10/1/1758, £30 (5 yrs from June '57). After 4 yrs admitted freeman as joi & cm on 8/8/1761 as s.o. Edward Tyler Lewes, cutler.

NM 22/3/1766: Edward Tyler Lewes, Cabinet and Chair-Maker, at the Back of the Inns, Norwich, Makes...viz. China, Breakfast, Side-Board, Dressing, Toilet, and Card Tables; Chairs, Couches, French Dressing and Corner Stools; Cabinets, Commodes, Chests, and double Chests of Drawers, Cloaths and Linen Chests; Stands for Candles, Tea kettles, Bureaus, Bedsteads, Firescreens, Desks, Book-cases and Clock-cases, likewise sells all Sorts of Glasses in Mahogany, Walnut-tree, and gilt Frames, Venetian Shades, &c.

P 1768, 1780 - St Peter Mancroft.

D 1783 (Tyler Edward Lewes) - 110 Magdalen St..

LIGHTING, Mark, aka Mark Clayton, tur, Yarmouth (1710). P(N) 1710.

LILLY, James, joi, Holkham (1739-1760d).

Lilly (sometimes spelled Lillie) worked at Holkham Hall from 1739 to 1758.

Much of his work was on fitted joinery, such as shelves, rather than furniture, though his first account, dated 29/12/1739, was "for making of Furniture for the New House – £17-12-6". The early accounts indicate that he was in partnership with a man called Copeman, who is otherwise unknown. A typical account book entry for 29/10/1743 reads: To Mr. Lillie for putting up Shelves and other work £2-14-11. Do. for preparing a closet for paper, putting up beds &c £3-7-2. Do. for making 2 fishing Stools, and frames for pictures £1-17-0.

After a 10-year gap he was paid £0-14-9 for

making and putting up chimney boards, £0-1-3 for a half-day putting up window curtains and £0-3-0 for "putting up a bed and mending the Boulting Mill"(14/7/1753), indicating that he was employed as much as a handyman as a joiner, but after another 5-year gap (1/4/1758) he was paid £7-7-0 for making "4 large walnuttree chairs", £3-0-0 for "4 small Settees for the Salloon", £1-1-0 for a "large Sopha for the Drawg. Room", £1-11-6 for a picture frame and £4-4-0 for 2 frames over the saloon chimney pieces.

Took apps James Codham, s.o. John, 1/5/1741, £15; William Burcham, 1/5/1753, 16 gns; Robert Braddock, 5/4/1755, £18 (Lillie).

Lilly was buried at Holkham on 27/2/1760.50

LINCOLN, Robert, cm, St John Sepulchre, Norwich (1793–1802).

30/12/1793 Apprenticed to Thomas Smith, 30 gns (5 yrs) (Lincolne), free 24/1/1801 as son of [blank] Lincoln.

LINDSEY, Sarah, up, Elm Hill, Norwich (1836–1850). D 1836, 1850 – working up.

Presumably widow of William Lindsey, qv.

LINDSEY, William, up, Elm Hill, Norwich (1784b-1831d).

NM 23/7/1831: Died. On Wednesday last, at his residence, Elm Hill, Mr. William Lindsey, aged 41, many years a respectable upholsterer of this city, leaving a wife and four children to lament their loss.

THE LING FAMILY, ups, Norwich.

A John Lyng, s.o. John Lyng, dyer, obtained his freedom as an upholsterer on 24/2/1784. He is otherwise unrecorded and is probably unrelated to the other Lings.

The family consists of John Ling (1) (1787b-1825d), his wife Elizabeth, who carried on the upholstery business after his death, and their son, John T.(2).

John (1) was apprenticed to William Burt on 24/6/1800 for £50, with a term of 6 yrs 9 mths. The date of his freedom is not recorded in the Norwich Freedom Register. He took over B.P. Titter's premises at No. 4 St Simon's in 1812, advertising that he just returned from London (presumably to buy goods rather than to work as a journeyman) [NM 11/4/1812]. He was already working for Thomas William Coke at Holkham Hall, and the accounts show that he worked extensively there doing repair work from 1811 until his death in 1825, his bills totalling £1,641-14-6.

His marriage to Elizabeth Piggin of St Andrew's Parish was recorded in the NM of 13/3/1813, and at about this time he moved to 14 Cockey Lane, advertising as an upholder, paper hanger, sofa and chair manufacturer [NM 24/4/1813 & 9/4/1814], only staying for a year or two before moving to the corner of Bridewell Alley [NM11/2/1815], taking over the premises vacated by Elizabeth Taylor and James Utting. The business lasted there until at least 1845.

In 1818 he advertised that he had enlarged his manufactory in Bridewell Alley [NM 1/8/1818], and was lucky to suffer little damage in a fire the following year:

NM 15/5/1819: On Wednesday forenoon smoke was discovered issuing from the upper part of the house of Mr. Ling, upholder, St. Andrew's occasioned by a flue being over heated and communicating to the feathers. Fortunately it was got under without doing much damage.

Two of his apprentices obtained their freedom, Thomas Bennett on 24/2/1819 and Thomas Scrape Lovewell on 3/5/1821.

There are poll book entries for St Simon & St Jude in 1812 and St Andrew from 1812 to 1824, and a directory entry for Bridewell Alley in 1822. He advertised that he had added further premises, enabling him to "manufacture every description of Furniture, from the plainest to the most superb" [NM 29/7/1820], two years later offering four-post bedsteads with hangings from £10 and mahogany chairs with hair seats, brass nailed, from 19 shillings [NM 13/4/1822] and reporting a "very considerable purchase of rosewood...Genuine French Polish at 4s per bottle" [NM 9/11/1822].

His trade card is illustrated in Pl. 28.

In the NC of 26/3/1825 he announced that he had re-built his premises, but within a few months he had died "in his 39th year" [NC 3/12/1825].

The following week his wife, Elizabeth, advertised that she was continuing the business "on behalf of Herself and Children" [NM 10/12/1825]. She continued work at Holkham Hall, on a rather more modest scale than her husband, her bills totalling £257-10-10 for the period 1827-1837. The NM of 31/3/1827 and 22/3/1828 carried advertisements for her Upholstery and Cabinet Manufactory with its "extensive stock of Furniture...Carpeting, Hangings..." She advertised for an apprentice to the cabinet trade [NM 28/3/1829] and the upholstery trade [NM 30/4/1831].

The son, John T., first appears in the 1836

directory and subsequently in an 1838 advertisement:

NM 22/9/1838 (supplement): To the Nobility, Clergy, and Gentry. Ling and Son, Manufacturers of Upholstery and Cabinet Furniture, Carpet and Paper-Hanging Warehouse, Corner of Bridewell Alley and Pottergate Street. Ling and Son beg most respectfully to inform the Families Furnishing, that at their Warehouse in Bridewell Alley they have ready for inspection an assortment of Elegant and Useful Furniture, which they can offer on the most advantageous I. Ling returns his acknowledgements for the patronage so many years conferred on his late Father, and trusts that as similar promptitude and exertions will be employed in the execution of Orders, he shall be honoured with the same support...Paper hangings from three-farthings per Yard. Gentlemen waited on at their Country Residences with Designs and Patterns free of expense...

Further entries for Ling & Son appear in the 1839–1845 directories, with the addition of carver & gilder to the range of services offered from 1842.

An example of the Ling & Son trade card is illustrated in Pl. 29. A circular tea table also bearing this card is shown in Pl. 30. Despite the Royal Coat of Arms there is no evidence that they had the Royal Warrant (cf. Ambrose Gedge).

There is an entry in the Norwich Freeman Register for John Chapman, cm, bound to John Ling, free 21/9/1829. As John Ling (1) had been dead for 4 years and John Ling (2) was still a child I can only suggest that Chapman was apprenticed to John Ling (1) but delayed obtaining his freedom.

N.B. Gives the best Price for old Plate Glass.

NM 21/8/1756: Norwich. Looking Glasses, Neatly fitted up in carv'd Frames, to be Sold very Cheap, by William Lock Carver...as cheap as in London.

NM 11/6/1757: William Lock, Frame-Maker, Carver & Gilder. Near the Globe Tavern in St. Andrew's, Norwich. Makes & sells all Sorts of Carved Sconce or Pier Glasses, Brackets, Chimney-Pieces and Picture Frames, Gilt either in Oyl or Burnish'd Gold; with Carvers and Gilders' work in its various Branches, expeditiously done after the neatest and newest Taste, at the lowest Prices. Also Black Peartree and Deal Frames for Maps, Prints or Drawings.

LOCK, William, cm up ph, Hingham (1829).

NM 19/12/1829: William Lock, Cabinet-maker, upholsterer and paper hanger, Hingham...has taken the situation occupied by Mr Morris (deceased) and hopes...N.B. All kinds of Brass Work kept for the use of the Trade.

LODGE, Samuel, up, Norwich. (1803–1817). 3/9/1803 Apprenticed to John Scott, £70 (5 yrs). P 1817 – Living in Norwich, freehold in Needham.

LONG, John, cm, Norwich; then London (1755-1787).

St Quintin was a very prolific advertiser in the local press, in this respect rivalling Joseph Gray. His father, also Perry, sold three twistering mills and associated apparatus on declining business in 1833, so presumably worked as a twisterer in the worsted industry [NM 16/11/1833]. Perry junior set up business in 1819 with his brother Edward at 52 Orford Hill, advertising that they had "so many years experience in the first manufactories in London, viz. Messrs. Tatham and Bailey, Gillows, &c." [NM 7/8/1819]. As he only obtained his freedom in 1817 the "so many" years cannot have amounted to more than two.

Edward's marriage, aged 21, on 19/3/1821, is recorded," after which there is no further mention of Edward, but by 1820 Perry had moved "over the water" to St George Colgate [P 1820] and by 1822 he had moved back, setting up in Queen Street, where he was to stay for the rest of his career [D1822, P 1824]. He named his establishment the New Colonnade Furniture Warehouse and embellished his newspaper advertisements with an engraving of its façade, showing a chiffonier, a selection of chairs, a torchère, a round tilt-top tea table and a Grecian sofa (Pl. 34).

The 1830 directory added mahogany merchant to his trade of cabinet-maker. His advertisements stressed that his goods were of a quality "equal to any house in London" but that his prices were 30% lower [NM24/9/1831, 3/12/1831]. An idea of the range and price of his stock is given by the following notice:

NM 6/10/1833: Colonnade Furniture Warehouse, Queen Street, Norwich. P. St. Quintin's Fashionable Stock of Elegant Upholstery and Cabinet Furniture will, on inspection, prove an opportunity rarely met with and seldom excelled in the quality of the Article and lowness of the Price, and submits the following as a guide to Families furnishing: Pedestal Sideboards £4-14-6. Ditto mahogany Post ditto 6–6–0. Tent Bedsteads ditto 2–10–0. Featherbeds to fit 1–12–6. Painted Wash Table with Drawer 0–8–6. Ditto Chairs 0–3–6. Paper Hangings, entire new patterns, per yard 0–0–2 1/2. Yard-wide Carpets, per yard 0–1–3 1/2. Gilt Cornices, Brass Poles, &c. fitted up with the newest designs, at the same low prices.

The 1836 directory added upholsterer to his trades of cabinet-maker and mahogany merchant. and carpets, chintzes and damasks were among the articles advertised following enlargement of his premises so as to exhibit a stock "that is unparalleled for extent in Norwich" [NM 18/3/1837]. Upholstery goods, including paper hanging, continued to feature prominently in his advertisements over the next few years [NM 28/4/1838, 10/11/1838, 16/3/1839]. An 1840 advertisement includes the comment that "P.S. Quintin takes this opportunity of remarking that Cabinet Furniture, if well manufactured, seldom deteriorates in value, while that of inferior make becomes, after a short period, nearly worthless" Directories continued to feature him as cm, up & mm until 1845.

The only record of an apprentice obtaining his freedom is that for James Tomlinson junior, who became free on 15/6/1841.

In February 1792 the partnership between Horth and Scott was dissolved. Scott advertised that "he has taken a Shop in the White-Lion lane, (many years occupied by Mr. Benjamin Gunton)..."[NM 11/2/1797]. Gunton was a linen-draper and staymaker whose address was given as 16 White Lion Lane in the 1783 directory. Meanwhile Horth advertised that he was carrying on the upholstery business at No. 17, presumably next door [NM 25/2/1797].

29/9/1781 took out Sun Insurance policy, no. 432532, for £700 including £500 for utensils and stock.

Selby was trading for at least 3 years before obtaining his freedom by purchase on 10/5/1794. He was presumably apprenticed elsewhere, coming to Norwich to work in partnership with Robert Punchard at the top of Elm Hill. He took an apprentice, John Kerr, for £63 on 30/4/1794, a month before obtaining his own freedom.

The partnership with Punchard was dissolved by mutual consent on 1/1/1795. Punchard stayed in Elm Hill while Selby moved to the Corner of Queen Street, "near Messrs. Gurney's Bank", where he became the only Norwich furniture-maker to specialise in camp furniture:

NC 13/6/1795: Camp Furniture, Thomas Selby... informs Military Gentlemen that he can... supply them with good Camp Furniture, of which a list may be had at his Upholstery Warehouse...

However the business foundered, and within two years was in the hands of assignees:

NC 15/7/1797: Thomas Selby, of Norwich, Upholder, having assigned over his Estate and Effects to Messrs. Barrow and Scott, Cotton Manufacturers, in St. Michel's [sic] of Coslany, for the equal benefit of his Creditors...

The 1830 Norwich poll-book records a Norwich upholsterer called Thomas Selby in London, who could be the same man. There is also a record in the NC of 24/2/1821 of the death "in Edinburgh, aged 42, of Agnes Nancy Barclay, wife of Mr. T. Selby, upholsterer, of Ipswich, leaving ten children..."

It is possible that our Thomas Selby came originally from Ipswich.

NC 10/11/1770: Wanted Immediately Chair-makers and two Cabinet Makers, that can execute their Work in a proper Manner - Such Men are desired to apply to Joseph Sharpe, Chair and Cabinet Maker, and Upholsterer, in Great Yarmouth, where they may be assured of Employ.N.B. On Saturday the 3d Inst. one George Gay left the said Joseph Sharpe in a dishonourable Manner, he having taken a Dozen Chairs to make that were bespoke of the said Ioseph Sharpe, and were to have been done on the 10th Inst. He also took more Money that the Value of his Work, which he has left unfinished. The said George Gay is about five Feet eight or nine Inches high, dark brown curled Hair, brown Eyes, and pitted with the Small Pox; had on a brown Coat and Waistcoat, with copper-coloured Buttons, and a Pair of Linen Drawers. Whoever will apprehend the said offender so as he may be brought to justice, shall be handsomely rewarded for their Trouble; and if the said George Gay will come back and finish his Work, he shall be freely forgiven, and have the Continuance of his former Employ. Letters will be answered.

NC 13/3/1773: Ran away, on Wednesday Morning last, from his Master Joseph Sharpe, Chair, Cabinet-Maker and Upholsterer, in Yarmouth, Thomas Capin, his Apprentice, without the least Provocation...[description]... Continuance...Favours, as he is determined to sell....as cheap as any Person in the County; and

notwithstanding the Price that has been set on Mahogany Chairs in the Public Papers, or whatever Price after should be fixed on them, or any other Kind of Furniture, he is determined to comply with rather than lose the Favours of his Friends...One Chair-maker, one Cabinet-maker, and one that can make mould and Wood Bottom Chairs, may have constant employ.

NM 8/1/1774: Wanted, a good Journeyman Chair-maker or Cabinet-maker, with a Sufficiency of Tools...applying to Joseph Sharpe, Chair and Cabinet-maker, Yarmouth.

25/12/1783 Took out Sun insurance (Policy no. 469865) on a tenanted house in Blind Middle Street (£90) and a tenanted cow house (£10)

25/12/1787 Took out Sun insurance (Policy no. 524499) on his dwelling house in Blind Middle Street (£160), household goods therein (£75), plate therein (£25), utensils and stock therein (£200), workshop & two warehouses adjoining behind (£40), utensils & stock therein (£75), utensils & stock in another warehouse (£125) and two tenanted houses in Conge Street (£180): total £880.

Samuel Sharpe evidently had a high reputation as a chair-maker. William Sharpe states that he is his nephew when advertising 13 years after Samuel's death, indicating that he was held in high regard. Examples of his work are known as he stamped his chairsS. SHARP. One, formerly in the V&A, is illustrated in Pl. 37. Another, one of a pair recently on the market, is shown in Pls. 38, 39 & 40.

Freedom on Norwich by purchase, 24/2/1737. In 1737 a Samuel Sharpe obtained the freedom of Yarmouth by apprenticeship to Samuel Errington, but no trade is quoted for either.

Wolterton Hall accounts, 19/5/1740: Samuel Sharpe – To 6 India Back't chairs fan ear'd £2-2-0. To 6 stain'd chairs £0-19-6.

NM 17/8/1751: Whereas Richard Gooch, Apprentice to Mr. Samuel Sharp, Chair-maker, in London-Lane, Norwich, left his Master's Service on Monday Morning last, and has not since been heard of. He is about five Foot eight Inches high, with a long Visage and pale complexion; had on when he went away, a brown Wig, a Snuff colour'd Coat, an old black Waistcoat and Leather Breeches. If the said Richard Gooch will return to his Service in six Days from the Date hereof, he shall be kindly received; but whoever harbours or employs the said Apprentice, shall be Prosecuted as the Law directs.

NM 9/10/1756: This is to acquaint the Public, That Samuel Sharp, Sen. Chair and Cabinet Maker, in the London-Lane, Norwich, being going to decline Trade, have the following Goods and House to dispose of, Viz. Great Choice of Mahogany, Foreign and English Walnut-Tree Chairs, and Others of various Sorts made after the best and neatest Manner; Mahogany Dining, Breakfasting, Dressing, Card, Jamb, round Box Corner Tables, Night and Tea Tables, in the most fashionable Taste; large and small Indian and Roman Waiters; Choice of Prints; plain, carved and Walnut-tree Drawers and Buroes, Washing and Tea-Kettle Stands; Choice of Looking-Glasses, in Walnut-tree Frames, plain, carved and gilt, all which will be Sold very Cheap. The Sale to begin now and continue till all are Sold, by their humble Servant, Samuel Sharp, Senior.

NM 19/3/1757. Notice of an auction of the remaining stock in trade consisting of a similar range to that quoted above. "N.B. The Chairs fitted up with Stuff Bottoms, cover'd with Horse-Hair and Canvas, Black Leather, &c."

Apprentice Samuel Sharpe jun. free 3/5/1757. NM 7/5/1757. Notice that William Kendall, qv, has taken over his shop.

NM 24/9/1757: Samuel Sharpe Takes this Opportunity to acquaint all Gentlemen Ladies and Others, that have favour'd him with their Custom, that he still carries on the Chair-Making Trade only, at his Work-Rooms adjoining Mr. Sayer's back Gate next the Castle Ditches, and at Brooke in Norfolk, where all Orders received shall be duly executed in the neatest Manner. He has a large Assortment of grand Specimens drafted on Paper, (of his own drawing) for the inspection of his Customers, having served his Apprenticeship therein; and likewise brought up to the above Branches from his Infancy; have also work'd in the principal Shops in London... Soon after starting his business he was involved in a dispute with Thorne and Leverington, who

accused him in the *Norwich Mercury* of poaching their customers [NM 15/10/1774]. He replied to

their charges in the next number [NM

22/10/1774], pleading that he had used "no other Method than what is generally made Use of by young Tradesmen, in distributing Hand Bills, to solicit public Favour" and went on to claim that Thorne & Leverington had gained credit from the work of William and his brother, who had stamped their initials, WS and ES under the "upper back rail", i.e. seat rail, of their chairs, "not being ashamed of our work". This interesting insight into the use of initial-stamping was documented by the author in 1992"

and in more detail in 2005. Between these two papers a set of chairs from Norfolk came to light stamped WS under the seat rail. These are based on Plate XII of the 1St edition of Chippendale's Gentleman and Cabinet-maker's Director (1754), and are likely to be the work of William Sharpe, probably dating from the time of his employment by Thorne & Leverington (Pls. 41 & 42).

Vol. 13, p. 317: 9/12/1793 Four Days have we stayed at home tho' fine Weather expecting Sudbury my Upholsterer from Norwich with my new Tables – but never came...

Vol. 13, p. 318: 10/12/1793 .. On our return home about 3 o'clock we found Mr. Sudbury with some

of his Men in a Cart at my house, having brought home my new Tables - They dined upon some cold Meat at my house & had plenty of good Liquor - Their Horses also were properly taken care of - They left my House about 4 in the Afternoon, very well pleased - The new Tables are three in Number, all of the best Mohogany and new, the middle one is a very large one and very wide, the other two are half rounds, to add to the middle Table - I am to give for them seven Guineas - He took my two large Tables & a smaller one in part of exchange for the others and he is to allow me for the three, only - £2:18:0 Briton [servant] had one of the large ones for his Brother - and Betty [servant] had the smallest for her Father - Briton paid Sudbury for his - £1:0:0 Betty paid ditto - for hers - £0:18:0.

In partnership with Robert Leverington he moved from the Bedlam Street address to St Stephen in 1772 [NM 14/11/1772]. The partners advertised again in 1774, including a request that people approached by their ex-journeyman chair-maker, William Sharpe, should continue to patronise them [NM 15/10/1774]. See William Sharpe for his response. Their advertisement also included a caution about another of their journeyman chairmakers, Thomas Powell, who had disappeared, leaving 6 walnut-tree chairs unfinished. "From the work he has done, it appears he is but an indifferent Hand, is very pressing for Money, and obtained a trifle more than was due to him, which not being sufficient for his purpose, he borrowed 2s. of one of his Shopmates, with which he went off."

Thorne did not obtain his freedom (by purchase) until 19/6/1775, by which time he had been trading in Norwich for at least 2 1/2 years. He took apprentices William Cook, 3/6/1775, £25 (5 yrs); Robert Watts, 26/6/1779, £49 (4 yrs); David Savory, 2/4/1784, 10 gns. Cook and Watts were both bound to "Edward Thorne & Co".

Thorne appears in poll-books at St. Stephen from 1780 to 1786 (and even, posthumously, in 1787) and in the 1783 directory at 4 St. Stephen's Churchyard.

Thorne was recommended to James Woodforde by his upholsterer, William Brooke, and he "gave him a good order" which was delivered a few days later:"

Had a Waggon Load of Goods brought me from Norwich this morning, Mr. Thorne the Cabinet Maker came with them and he dined & spent the afternoon with us – All my things left at the Kings Head at Norwich by me were brought home in the above Waggon and with them the following Goods of Mr. Thornes with their Prices. To a very handsome Mohogany Wardrobe – £9:9:0. To a Ditto – new Mohogany dressing Chest – £3:13:6. To a Do. Swing dressing Glass with Drawers –

£1:11:6. To a round Mohogany Table – £1:7:6. To a Mohogany Bason Stand – £0:10:6. To Do. – Tea Chest – £0:7:0. Every thing came safe but the Glass Drawers which broke Paid Thorne this Afternoon for his Goods – £17:0:0.

Further trade with Woodforde followed:

Woodforde Diary Vol. 7, p. 64. 2/8/1776 Had a Mohogany Beaurou & Book-Case, with some new Mohogany Chairs & a Voider & cheese-plate of Mohogany brought from Mr. Thorne's of Norwich to day & he came with them & he dined & spent the Afternoon with us – Gave the Waggoner a Dinner and – £0:1:0.

Vol. 7, p. 75. 27/9/1776 ...Mr. Leverington Partner with Mr. Thorne came to my House this morning to put up the multiplying Wheel to my Jack &c. and he dined & spent the Afternoon but made no stay – Mr. Thorne's Man breakfasted, dined, supped & slept here again...

Vol. 7, p. 76. 28/9/1776 ...Mr. Thorne's Man finished about noon, could not stay to Dinner – I gave him going away – £0:1:6.

Vol. 7, p. 80. 22/10/1776 ...Mr. Leverington Partner with Thorne called on me this morning to Dunn me for some Money, but could not afford to let him have any, however I promised to let him have 10 Pounds on Friday next ...Mr. Leverington dined & spent the Afternoon with us.

Vol. 7, p. 81. 25/10/1776 ...Paid Mr. Thorne a part of a Bill at Norwich – £10:0:0.

After a 7-year gap Woodforde took delivery of a dressing table, for which he paid £1/16/-.92

Although Thorne was not a resident of Weston Longville his final, poignant entry in the diary was his burial there by Woodforde:

Woodforde Diary Vol. 11, p.181. 5/11/1786. I breakfasted, dined, &c. &c. again at home...Walked to church this Morn' before 8. o'clock and at 8. buried Mr. Edwd. Thorne (late Cabinet-Maker in St. Stephen Parish, Norwich) and who had made many things for me – he died of the Palsy had been some time ill – he was 39. years old; I had no Hatband or Gloves & only three Men attended at his Funeral – one of them a Brother – I recd. for my Fee only 0/10/6 as I considered his Circumstances & knew him.

Counterpanes, very fine Mahogany Dining, Jamb, Pembroke and Claw Tables, beautiful Mahogany double, single and dressing Chests of Drawers, several Oval, Jamb and Dressing Glasses, in gilt and Mahogany Frames, Mahogany and Walnuttree Chairs, Hair seats and brass nailed, Sofa, two Mahogany Bureaus and Book-cases, Scotch carpets, Bath Stoves, Linen, two Time Pieces, Screw Range, Kitchen Furniture, Brewing Utensils, and sundry Articles of Household Furniture.

NM 6/7/1805: Holkham Annual Sheep-Shearing...Of the machines and implements exhibited at Holkham, the judges recommended a Bolting Machine, for its simplicity, cheapness and utility, as worthy of the premium. This machine was invented by a deserving and humble cabinetmaker, of Burnham Market, whose name is David Thurston...The machine is turned with much ease by hand, stands within a short compass, and costs not more than 12 guineas. How much the poor would be benefitted by having such a machine accessible to them in every parish? Mr. Coke presented the inventor of this bolting machine with a cup.

NM 24/10/1835: General Furnishing Ware

Rooms, Duke's Palace, Norwich. S.W. Thurston, In declining business...thanks...favours conferred on himself and father for the last thirty-six years... clearing the premises...remainder of his Stock considerably under the Cost Price.

TITTER, Benjamin Palmer, cm chm, 4 St Simon & St Jude; then Providence House, 32 Pottergate Street, St Gregory; then 8 Trafalgar Place, Lakenham Hall Road, New Lakenham, Norwich (1772b-1831d).

30/5/1786 Apprenticed to William Grant, £21, free 26/4/1794 as s.o. Timothy Titter, grocer.

P(N) 1799 – London. 1806, 1807 – St Simon & St Jude. 1812–1820 – St Gregory.

Following his apprenticeship Titter moved to London and spent time as a journeyman in the large, high-quality workshop of George Oakley in Old Bond Street, returning to Norwich some time after 1799 to work as foreman to Samuel Martin in Surrey St. until 1805, when he took over the business of William De Caux at No. 4 St. Simon & St Jude [NM 20/4/1805]. The advertisement which gives this information also states that he was agent for Sheraton's Cabinet Makers' Encyclopaedia.

He designed an expanding table with leaves supported on a system of telescoping runners, which he first announced in the following advertisement:

NC 9/8/1806: Cabinet & Chair Warehouse, No. 4, St. Simon & Jude. B.P. Titter, (late De Caux) Returns... thanks...completed many fashionable articles...as specimens...particularly a Table so constructed as to answer the purpose of a Loo, Breakfast, Occasional, and Dining Table, to accommodate parties from six to thirty persons, upon one frame and perfectly safe, and full 30 per cent. cheaper than any other tables on pillar and claw feet...he being the Sole Inventor and Manufacturer. To prevent future impositions,

all Tables sold by him have his name engraved on the plates of the handles.

A second advertisement gives a little more detail: NM 25/7/07: Cabinet & Chair Trade, No. 4, Saint Simon and Jude, B.P. Titter...thanks...New-Invented Dining Tables, for which he obtained a premium in London, on exhibiting the model, in March last, with large orders besides...Specimens of the above are to be seen, from 14l. to 6ol. per set...The number of London Mechanics employed enables him to execute orders in the first stile...Good Cabinet-Makers Required.

A number of these tables survive. The example illustrated (Pls. 44, 45 & 46) was supplied to Benjamin Cubitt of Sloley Hall, Norfolk, and Titter probably also supplied the set of rosewood dining chairs which accompany it (Pl. 47). In their more compact form his extending tables are sound, but when fully extended they tend to be rather unstable. The illustrated example measures 4 ft. 6 ins. square in its compact form and extends to 14 ft. 6 ins. with the insertion of 6 leaves, all of different widths.

By 1808 he was selling mahogany in boards, planks and veneers [NM 2/7/1808] and he also sold prepared cane for chairs [NM 14/1/1809]. The business thrived and by 1810 he was advertising for "four or five good workmen", specifying payment at the full Norwich book price [NM 3/3/1810]. The following month he took the Bexfield brothers into partnership for a 10-year term:

NM 28/4/1810: B.P. Titter... has taken into Partnership Messrs. Richard & Joseph Bexfield, men of extensive experience in trade, and who have for some time acted as Superintendents in the manufacturing part of his Business. B.P. Titter & Co. Cabinet and Chair Manufacturers, Dealers in Mahogany, &c. No. 4...

The next year saw the business move to Pottergate:

NM 21/9/1811: Providential House, No. 32, Pottergate-street, Norwich... New-invented and improved Furniture, in the first Style of Elegance and Fashion. From No. 4... B.P. Titter and Co. ...have fitted up their premises as a Manufactory, Ware-rooms, &c.

The ware-rooms were enlarged in 1813 [NM29/5/1813]. The following year there was industrial unrest in the trade because inflationary pressure during the Napoleonic wars had resulted in the masters agreeing to a 121/2% rise in prices paid to journeymen in 1810. In 1814 Titter, among others, evidently retracted from this

agreement and the journeymen threatened to incorporate hidden defects into their work:

NM 10/12/1814: To the Master Cabinet and Chair Makers of Norwich. We, your Journeymen, return you our grateful thanks for your steady observance of the agreement made between us, May the 12th 1810, of an advance of twelve and a half per cent. on the Norwich Prices, on account of the then High Price of Provision which we are sorry to say have not in general met any reduction, which we hoped would have been the case of a Continental Peace; this disappointment must have been unpleasant both to you and us much more to find Mr. Titter, one of those Employers who signed the said agreement has retracted and reduced the wages to the old system; we are therefore fearful, were you to follow his example, that the articles we manufacture must in a great degree be slighted, which the eye of the most minute Employer could not search out or discover, which would prove in a little time of great disadvantage both to you and the public in general, and we shall loose that credit which Norwich Workmen have for these last twenty years boasted of in the Cabinet and Chair Branch; we therefore petition you to continue our present prices till provision find its level, and most assuredly we shall, as we have hitherto done, continue our best exertions in manufacturing every part thereof to your credit and to the general satisfaction of your respectable employers. We subscribe ouselves your most obedient and humble Servants, The Journeymen Cabinet and Chair Makers.

Titter trained the following apprentices: Obadiah Loads, free 24/2/1818; John Buttifant, free 16/3/1820; James Blazeby, free 24/2/1822; Joseph Scotter, free 24/2/1828.

He was one of those who signed the "Declaration of Loyalty to his Majesty's Person and Government" following Peterloo (NM 2/10/1819).

The partnership with the Bexfields expired in 1820 and Titter withdrew, leaving the brothers to run the business [NM 6/5/1820]. He set up as an "Appraiser or Valuator of every kind of Household Furniture, Fixtures, &c" [NM 13/5/1820], moving to the new suburb of Lakenham, from where he also appears to have dealt in property, offering a selection of neighbouring houses for sale [NC 3/3/1827].

His death was announced in 1831:

NC 8/1/1831: Died. On Wednesday last...in St. John's Maddermarket, of a lingering asthma,

which terminated in a decline, Mr. Benj. Palmer Titter, aged 58, formerly an eminent cabinet-maker and upholsterer, in St. Gregory's.

TOMLINSON, William (1), up, St Giles's Broad Street, Norwich (1814–1818).

NM 22/1/1814: Upholstery & Carpet Warehouse, St. Giles's Broad-street. W. Tomlinson...is removed to a situation adjoining the Woolpack Inn, in the above street...large assortment of Carpets...

NM 16/11/1816: Tomlinson's Bankruptcy. The Creditors who have proved their debts... Bankruptcy against William Tomlinson, of the city of Norwich, Upholder...a dividend of Ten Shillings in the Pound...

NM 14/2/1818: Commissioners... Bankruptcy... dated the fourteenth day of March, one thousand, eight hundred, and sixteen...against William Tomlinson, of...Norwich, Upholder, Dealer and Chapman...

TOMLINSON, William (2), up, Post Office Court, Gentleman's Walk, St Peter Mancroft; then (with Cutler) 22 Rampant Horse Street, St Stephen; then 7 Davey Place, St Peter Mancroft; then 3 Bank Street, St Michael at Plea; then London Street (1810–1857d).

NM 24/11/1810: Upholstery Warehouse (late Post-Office Court) Gentleman's Walk, William Tomlinson, Jun. Being just returned from London...has taken the Premises lately occupied as a Post-Office...every branch of Business...

NM 7/9/1816: Upholstery and Carpet Warehouse, 22, Rampant-Horse Street. T. Cutler & W. Tomlinson... have entered into Partnership... connections in the Metropolis... add the business of an Undertaker...

Formed partnership with Thomas Cutler [NM 7/9/1816] and agreed with Samuel Martin that that they would pass cabinet work to him if he passed upholstery to them [NM 14/12/1816].

D 1822 - Cutler & Tomlinson, Rampant Horse St. 1839, 1842 - 3 Bank St., St Michael at Plea. 1845 - London St. 1852 - Bank Plain.

The partnership with Cutler was dissolved in 1823 [NM 6/9/1823].

NM 4/10/1823: Upholstery Warehouse, No. 7, Davey Place. William Tomlinson...has taken the above situation...

NC 18/9/1825: ...Auction...12th September and following days. All the valuable Stock in Trade and Household Furniture of Mr. Wm. Tomlinson, Upholsterer, Davey-place, Norwich. The Stock consists of...

Having sold his stock Tomlinson evidently spent

the next few years working for William Freeman, the cabinet-maker, but he set up on his own again in 1836, provisionally at his residence near the Rose Corner, Upper King Street, where he advertised "a most elegant assortment of Berlin Embroidery of entirely New Designs, for Sofas, Ottomans, Minchs [?], Chairs, Screens, &c., &c., which will be sold with all the proper materials for the completion of each article..." [NM 26/3/1836]. He then moved into 12 London Street, and in a long advertisement stressed the durability of his work:

NM 2/7/1836: ...With regard to Chairs, he has lately had to pack some which he made 25 years ago - the frames of which are as sound and good as when they were first put together, though they have been in constant wear during the whole period, and his stuffing has never gone down, or have had any reason for repair, nor have they been recovered but once during the same time. These Chairs he made for the Rev. W.F. Drake, to whom he appeals for the truth of this statement; and with regard to Chair Stuffing generally, which has been with so much reason complained of, for want of softness and durability, two qualities which only good Workmen can unite, he intends in the lowest priced Goods to use the best materials he can afford, and by adopting the neglected system of the first Workmen in the London Trade, to insure these requisites as far as possible; and for the higher class of Goods, he has made an arrangement with the very best Workman in London to have them stuffed up there without any additional charge to his Business, as he is determined no person shall turn out better Work in this, or in any branch of the Upholstery ...

An advertisement for an apprentice followed:

NM 16/7/1836: [Similar ad to 2/7/1836 plus...] A well-educated Youth, of industrious habits and respectably connected, is wanted as Out-door Apprentice. 4 One who has a taste for Drawing would be preferred, and that pursuit would meet with every possible encouragement. Premium is not an object with the above qualifications.

He had a fortunate escape from a fire the following year:

NM 2/9/1837: On Wednesday evening, about eight o'clock, a fire broke out at Mr. Tomlinson's upholstery warehouse, Bank Street. It was occasioned by a candle being placed too near the window-blind, which caught fire and communicated to the paper. Assistance was immediately obtained, and it was happily got

under without much damage.

He advertised quite frequently over the following 3 years, the following being a typical example:

NM 23/3/1839: Upholstery, Paper Hanging, and Berlin Embroidery Warehouse, No. 3, Bank Street. William Tomlinson...thanks...large stock of Damasks, Velvet Plushes, Moreens, Chintzs, &c. and many thousand pieces of Paper Hangings, beginning at 9d. per piece. In order that there may be no mistake, W.T. begs to say, the above do not comprise the trash usually puffed off, and erroneously called cheap, but that these goods will be found fully equal in quality to the fair and reasonable prices charged, and are the very best the manufacturer can produce...

He also at times advertised for journeymen:

NM 12/9/1840: N.B. Steady and Good Cabinet and Chair Makers wanted; also a First-rate Carver.

Will proved 18/2/1857. Effects sworn under £200.35

TOMPSON, Charles, tur, Aylsham (1753).

Took app Thomas Grix, 15/1/1753, 3 gns.

TOMPSON, John Miles, cm, Norwich (1799-1810).

TOWNSHEND, Samuel, cm c&g, Yarmouth; then Norwich [see D refs] (1822-1852).

His son, Samuel Thomas Townshend, was a c&g, picture-frame and looking-glass manufacturer, whom directories record at 13 Charing Cross, Norwich, from 1854 to 1896. He produced a variety of trade labels which are not infrequently found on picture frames. Other members of the family continued the business until at least 1929.

Townson worked at Holkham Hall from 1754 to 1758. The account books show payment on 29/6/1754 for 2 bedsteads with sacking bottoms (£2-14-0), one with a lath bottom (£1-10-6) and a fourth bed (bottom unspecified) for £1-15-0. Three of these beds were sent to Thanet House, the Leicesters' London house. On 28/6/1755 he was paid £1-16-0 for "3 Chinese Cherry tree Chairs for the Atticks" and £0-16-0 for "an Arm'd Chair of the same sort".

On 4/10/1755 he was paid a guinea for "a walnut tree frame & drawer for an inlaid Top for a Table", the top presumably having been made by a London cabinet-maker. The same account included £0-9-6 for a mahogany table and £0-15-0 for 4 close stools. On 17/12/1757 he was paid £0-16-0 for 2 wainscot close stools.

In 1758 he was entrusted with higher quality work, with payment of £10–4–0 for 3 carved mahogany chairs on 1/4/1758. These were expensive at £3–8–0 each when one considers that the London maker, George Smith Bradshaw, was paid £20–17–5 (£2–19–7 each) for 7 "Mahog. Chairs very richly Carved to match a pattern one" in June 1756. On the same account Townson was paid £2–15–0 for a reading desk and £5–15–6 for 2 carved and gilt mahogany chairs. Finally he was paid £0–15–0 for a close stool on 23/12/1758, four times the price he charged in 1755.

TRESTED, Thomas, chm, Sign of the White Hart, by St Peter's Steeple End, Norwich and The Old Swan, St Maries, Bury St Edmunds (1725-1729).

NG 27/1/1728ns: This is to give Notice to all Gentlemen, Ladies, and others, that Thomas Trested from London maketh all Sorts of Cane Chairs, Cover'd Chairs, and Easie Chairs, Pincushion Bottom Chairs, and fine Rush-Bottom'd Chairs, Seats and Squabbs, Round Stools and Square Stools, at a more Reasonable Rate than in London: He also mends all Sorts of Cane Chairs very Reasonably. My Shop is at the Sign of the White-Hart by St. Peter's Steeple End in Norwich, near the Market-place.

Trested simultaneously maintained properties in Colchester and Bury St Edmunds, taking out Sun insurance policies on them (4 rented tenements in St Botolph's Parish, Colchester, 3/12/1725, no. 36241 – £300; The Old Swan, St Maries, Bury, 15/8/1729, no. 37503) – £300. Both policies state that he is "of Bury St Edmunds".

NM 19/5/1810. Cosignator of agreement to pay 121/1% above Norwich Prices – see Samuel Martin.

TUCK, cm, Burnham (1820d).

NM 17/6/1820: Died...On Wednesday last, at the King's Arms Tavern, St. Michael at Plea, after a short illness, Mr. Tuck, cabinet-maker, late of Burnham, in Norfolk.

TUCKER, James, up, St Stephen's Plain, Norwich (1822).

NM 18/5/1822: Cheap cabinet, upholstery, carpet and paper hanging warehouse, St. Stephens Plain, Norwich. James Tucker from Messrs. Bailey and Saunders, London...just returned from London with a large assortment of the newest patterns in the above branches.

TUNNEY, Thomas, up, Norwich; then North Walsham; then Leicester; then Nottingham (1725b-1799d).

Freedom of Norwich 20/7/1745 as s.o. Oliver Tunney, blacksmith.

NM 20/8/1757: Thomas Tunney, Upholster, in North-Walsham, Who leaves off Trade at Old Michaelmas next, propose selling off his Stock immediately at prime Cost; consisting of a great Number of ready-made Beds compleat, standing; whole Sets of Paper of the newest Patterns for hanging of Rooms, some so low as Twopence Halfpenny a Yard; Blankets, Quilts, Rugs, Bed-Ticks, Cheneys, Feathers, &c...Also all Sorts of Furniture to sell...

NM 25/3/1758: ... Auction, at Thomas Tunney's, Upholster, In Northwalsham, All Sorts of Household Furniture, and all Sorts of Upholsterers Goods fresh and New, viz Blankets...

P(N) 1786 (Tunny) – Nottingham. 1787 – Nottingham.

Gentleman's Magazine, Feb. 1799. Report of his death, aged 74, "formerly an upholsterer at Leicester".

TURNER, Henry, gilder, Norwich (1831).

Apprenticed to William Freeman, free 3/5/1831.

TURNER, James, c&g, Chapel Street, Crook's Place, Heigham, Norwich (1821-1852).

NM 6/1/1821 Cosignator of Address of Loyalty to the King.

Apprenticed to Messrs. Freeman & Co., free 24/2/1823.

P 1824 – St Stephen. 1830–1835 – Heigham. D 1852 – Opposite St Mary's Church.

TURNER, Miles James, cm, Yarmouth (1802b-1824).

29/3/1824 - Marriage, aged 21, to Caroline Burton.⁹⁶

TURRELL, John, cm, Yarmouth. (1805–1806).
Took app George Fair, 10/1/1805, £40 (5 yrs).
P(Nfk) 1806 (Tyrell) – Yarmouth.

TURRELL, John William, Yarmouth; then Somerstown, London (1821–1831).

1/5/1821* apprenticed to John Fish, Yarmouth,

free 16/7/1830. P(Y) 1830, 1831 – Somerstown, London.

TWIDDY, George, up, St Michael at Thorn, Norwich (1777-1787).

TWIDDY, James, cm, St Michael at Thorn, Norwich (1801–1830).

UTTING, James Henry sen., up, London; then

Corner of Bridewell Alley; then 7 St Andrew's Broad Street, Norwich; then London (1793–1830d).

P 1802 – London. 1812 – St Andrew, Norwich. After finishing his apprenticeship he moved to London and worked "in the most fashionable houses in the west end of town". In 1807, on the death of his previous master, Thomas Taylor, he was taken on as partner by Taylor's widow, Elizabeth, qv [NM 18/7/1807], until she retired in 1814, when he took over the business and moved from Bridewell Alley to St Andrew's Broad St. [NM 17/9/1814]. An 1816 advertisement shows one of the hazards of taking on a large order:

NM 23/11/1816: Upholstery and Cabinet Warerooms, St. Andrew's Broad-street. J.H. Utting, Upholder, Appraiser and Auctioneer has to sell very cheap...1500 yards of carpeting and hearth rugs, 1000 pieces of Paper Hangings... Bedsteads...mahogany Secretary and Book-case, Chairs, Tables, &c. 10 prime seasoned goose Featherbeds...a great part of which were intended to complete the order of a Baronet in the county, deceased...

Just over a year later he was declared bankrupt [NM 24/1/1818] and his stock-in-trade, household furniture and other effects were put up for auction [NM 14/2/1818]. Another auction followed a year later [NM 20/3/1819]. He moved to London, possibly to join his son, and he died there on 3/7/1830 [NM 10/7/1830].

UTTING, James Henry jun., Norwich; then 11 Newman Street, Oxford Street, London (1825-1840).

Free 2/4/1825 as s.o. James Henry Utting sen.

P 1830 – London. It is possible that this entry refers to his father, who died in London in 1830, but a Sun insurance policy of 1840 [ref 1339920] confirms that James Henry jun. was working in London by then. His utensils and stock were insured for £300. There was a large timber yard immediately behind his property at 11 Newman Street.²⁷

UTTING, Robert, up, East Dereham (1768-1814). NM 26/3/1768: Robert Utting, Upholster, in Dereham...makes and sells all Sorts of Upholstery Furniture in the modern Taste.

Took app James Martin, 21/10/1793, £21 (6 yrs). P(Nfk) 1806 (Utten) – Dillington, East Dereham. His first wife, Elizabeth, died in 1807, aged 81 [NC 17/1/1807]. He remarried [NC 21/1/1809]

and his second wife died in 1814, in her 75th year [NM 5/2/1814].

The premises and, presumably, the stock failed to sell and he decided to continue the business under the management of his relative, Robert le Neve Utting, qv:

WOOD, Edward, cm, Norwich (1791-1807). 17/10/1791 Apprenticed to Thomas Norris, free 21/9/1807.

WOOD, Philip, up apsr, 8 Cockey Lane, Norwich; then Woodbridge, Suffolk; then Walsham le Willows, Suffolk; then Wattisfield, Suffolk, then Suffield (1777–1806).

18/1/1766 Apprenticed to Henry Withers, £50 (6 yrs) (Phillip). Free 21/6/1779 by purchase.

NM 2/10/1777: Cockey-Lane, Norwich... Philip

WOODROW, John Fuller, tur, South Town; then The Conge, North Quay, Yarmouth (1830–1845). D 1822, 1830 – South Town. 1836–1845 – The Conge.

WOODS, Hazel, cm, Diss (1837).

NM 15/4/1837. Married Maria Buxton, both of Diss.

WOODS, William, tur, Norwich & East Dereham [see NM & D refs] (1837-1845).
