FRONTISPIECES & OTHER EARLY ENGRAVINGS

In the hope of finding engraved illustrations of 16th and 17th century furniture, I have been searching among frontispieces and other engraved plates in many volumes published pre 1700. As yet I have found few but a vast field of search remains.

Figs 4, 5 & 6 can however serve as a reminder of the many modest bracket-supported hanging shelves of which very few can have survived, but which must have been made to serve, many useful purposes in addition to that of book storage. It may be significant, suggesting common usage, that Francis Bacon, Viscount St Albans, one time Lord Chancellor of England is depicted in Fig. 4 as having the same type of bracket supported single bookshelf as the humble recluse Henry Welby has in Fig. 5. Both were engraved by William Marshall, Welby's in 1637 and Bacon's in 1640.

Fig. 6 is from the 1659 second edition, but first in English, of Everard's "A Discovery of Tobacco" first published in Antwerp, but the presence of the often called "chaise Lorraine" type of chair, then in common use in France and the Low Countries, suggests that the original Antwerp engraving was re-used for the English edition which, incidentally, shows the same type of hanging bookshelf in use across the Channel.

Fig.7 merely offers details of coffin construction and presumably implies long usage of the term "coffin stool".

Details of other early engravings of furniture needed and most welcome.
