Ralph Todd (1856–1932) arrived in Newlyn in 1883, a year after Walter Langley had settled there and prior to the appearance of Stanhope Forbes on the scene in 1884. After a stay of nine years, Todd departed to Helston, before finally settling in the Lizard Peninsula.
