'SEARANCKE' not 'SPARANCK'

In RFS Newsletter 34, 2001, Robert Parrott revealed the existence of a late eighteenth-century comb back Windsor chair with vase-shaped splat, crook underarm supports, cabriole legs and cross stretcher with dart- or arrowhead-shaped ends. The chair was said to be stamped 'SPARANCK' and Robert Parrott had made no progress in working out what the significance of these letters might be: he wondered whether they might be some form of institutional mark.

I think he may have misread his pencil rubbing of the stamp. The second letter is an 'E' not a 'P'- the beginning of the horizontal stroke of the bottom of the 'E' is just visible. I also think that there is another vertical just faintly discernible after the 'K', which I would suggest is the beginning of another 'E'. Thus reread we have 'SEARANCKE'.

One Bunn Searancke, farmer, was married at Chesham on 7 May 1759.6 One Atwood Searancke was apprenticed to a millwright named John Rolfe in Thetford, Norfolk on 4 March 1780.7 Other Searanckes may be found in the eighteenth century in Hertfordshire, Norfolk, Suffolk, Essex and London. One branch of the Searancke family had more than a dozen public houses in the St Albans/Hatfield area in the late eighteenth century. It was not uncommon for chairmakers to have their workshops on licensed premises.8

The only Searancke associated with furniture-making that I have tracked down so far is C(harles) J(ohn) Searancke (1819–1888) 'Cabinet Maker, Upholsterer, Paper Hanger & Undertaker, Bayle, Folkestone'. According to the 1871 census he was born in Taverham just outside Norwich. All his

advertisements are in the 1860s which is too late for Robert Parrott's chair, but I wonder whether one of his ancestors may have had a hand in the chair?
